Little Boy Dies From Lockjaw, Result of a Cold.

Ingersoll, Dec. 27. - A short illness from lockjaw resulted in the death of Tony, the 9-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Marello, on Sunday morning. He was seized with the disease on Thursday night last on his return home from attending a Christmas entertainment in the Baptist Tabernacle. He asked for something to eat when he entered the house, but soon complained that his jaws were stiff and he was unable to eat the lunch that had been prepared. His parents were of the opinion that he was suffering from a cold, and a physician was not called until Saturday morning. Practically no hope was then held out
