6. T. R. WOULD CLOSE WILLIAM, BURWELL; Bishop Williams' Promises TO RUN FOUR ELEVATED TRACKS IN CITY

Pailway Committee of Council Informally Discuss Grand Trunk Crossing Plans--- In Several Difficult Problems To Be Tackled --- Mr. Brownlee's Suggestions.

The railway committee of the city council met last night and in an informal manner went over the plans of the Grand Trunk for the improvement of the line in London. As will be noticed from the accompanying epitoms of the proposals, the scheme of the company is practically as announced in the Advertiser of a couple of weeks ago when Manager McGuigan was in the city. The new depot was not considered last night.

The plans which were considered, and which were submitted by Supt. Brownlee, were made up of a dozen or more blue prints, showing the elevations of the proposed overhead tracks, the viaducts, the subways and so forth.

The object of the meeting was to merely familiarize the members of the committee with what the company proposes doing, so nothing of a definite character in the way of counter proposals was decided upon, though quite a number of important suggestions were noted for future reference, It being the intention of the city to have Mr. Brownlee here next Tuesday night, when the whole matter will be discussed in a formal manner.

City Engineer Graydon had gone over the plans, and from them had prepared a statement which showed in a concise manner the elevations of the company's tracks at each street over which elevated lines will be run.

From this it was ascertained that the Grand Trunk only contemplates erecting such lines as far as the city is concerned, from the Wharncliffe road to Adelaide street, and not through the city to a point east of Rectory street, as had previously been or nounced.

Thus, it appears that the crossings over which the little belt street cars run at intervals of ten minutes, is to remain a level one
