"The child did not go into the water three times before I arrived there, as he was just a minute ahead of me. I told him to go in after the child, but he said that he would not, so I went in myself. He then followed me in and the boy was got out. That is the simple statement of fact."

**ASK MORE POWERS
FOR HEALTH BOARDS**

Some Radical Changes Proposed in Bill Before the Legislature.

Toronto, March 29.—Gordon C. Wilson, M. P. for North West, is introducing an amendment to the public health act, which contains some important changes. The discretionary power heretofore vested in municipal councils, giving them power to grant sums considered necessary by local boards of health, has been made obligatory by substituting the word "shall" for "may." Another important amendment provides that in cases of dissatisfaction with the action of the local board of health a complaint may be registered with the provincial board. The bill also aims at restricting the authority of attending physicians in cases of smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, cholera or typhoid. Under the present act the board of health, medical health officer or attending physician or any one of them may give orders which will result in the removal of persons from school because of contagious diseases and the destruction of their clothing. Mr. Wilson's bill will take away this authority and provides further that in cases where children are removed from school because of contagious diseases it will not be sufficient to present a certificate from a legally qualified practitioner to assure the child's return. The certificate must come from the medical health officer. Under the new bill the names of the specific diseases before mentioned are struck out and the words "contagious diseases" substituted, a very material widening of the operation of the act.

Introduced by Mr. Wilson and Allan Studholme, the motion was carried. Under the bill, a deputation from the joint boards of health of Hamilton and Dundas visited Dr. Hodgges, provincial medical health officer, this morning.

Dr. Roberts, medical health officer of Hamilton, and Dr. Bertram, of London, were accompanied by Mr. Stanton, who assisted in drafting the measure, also spoke. Mr. Stanton said that he did not want to have any misunderstanding as to the bill before the House thoroughly understood its import.
