Fire Risks in the Pembroke Blaze

Pembroke, Nov. 5.—Following is a list of the chief insurance companies who held risks on the buildings destroyed in yesterday's fire, with the amounts, totalling nearly \$180,000. The total amount of insurance will exceed this, however, and may reach \$225,000: Liverpool, London and Globe, \$18,000; North British and Mercantile, \$15,950; Guardian, \$18,550; London and Lancashire, \$7,200; Queen's, \$15,000; British American, \$10,750; Western, \$21,075; Atlas, \$11,840; Home, \$8,325; Law, Union and Crown, \$4,650; London Assurance, \$2,500; North American, \$7,700; Equity, \$6,700; Sovereign, \$3,000; St. Paul, \$4,500; Metropolitan, \$2,550; Canadian Fire, \$2,500; Ontario, \$2,000; Perth Mutual, \$2,200; Standard Mutual, \$1,600; London Mutual, \$2,800; Commercial Union, \$6,300; Yorkshire, \$3,000.

Republicans 115, Democrats 176

Chicago, Nov. 5.—According to returns from all congressional districts in the United States, the next national House of Representatives will consist of 115 Republicans and 176 Democrats. It is possible that these figures may be changed later by returns from a few districts, from which entire figures have not been obtained.

Regarding the presidency, there are two states still in doubt, Maryland and Missouri. The complete returns give the former to Bryan and the latter to Taft, but in both cases the majority is in the hundreds, and a recount may change the result. Missouri was yesterday credited to Mr. Bryan, and the change gives Mr. Taft 227 votes in the electoral college, instead of 309, leaving 156 for Mr. Bryan. In Missouri Attorney-General Hadley is elected governor. Mr. Hadley is the first Republican to hold the office in the state in 35 years. In Michigan Governor Warner is re-elected over the Democratic candidate, Mr. Hermans, by 22,531. But one Democrat will get into the next Legislature.

British Fleet to Encircle the Globe

London, Nov. 5.—It has been said that, following the successful manoeuvres of the United States navy, the British Government is planning to send a fleet of warships around the world. Officials of the admiralty were questioned this evening, but all they would say was: "There is no information we can give you on this matter."

This negative statement, however, would seem to support the intimation that such a tour has been suggested, but under the present political conditions in Europe it is not thought all probable that the admiralty would dispatch a fleet in any way comparable to the United States battleship fleet. There is a possibility that the squadron under Sir Percy Scott, which is at present in South Africa, and which has been ordered to South America, may be brought home by way of the far east and the Suez Canal.

MICHAEL PONZI FOUND GUILTY

Summary Justice for the Italian
Slayer of Fellow Countryman at Ingersoll.

Woodstock, Nov. 5.—Michael Ponzi, who was charged with having thrown the stone which caused the death of a fellow-Italian, Pardi Constantine, is getting quick Canadian justice.

On Sunday afternoon at 4:30 the tragedy took place in the C. P. R. yards at Ingersoll, where gangs of Italians were living in their boarding cars.

Monday noon Ponzi was arrested at Dorchester.

The same afternoon he was remanded to jail by the Ingersoll magistrate.

Tuesday night he was committed for trial on the charge of murder.

Wednesday morning he went to a grand jury.

Wednesday afternoon a true bill for murder was brought in, and at once the prisoner was put on trial for his life before Justice Magee and a jury.

This afternoon the case went to the jury, who brought in a verdict of manslaughter. Ponzi will be sentenced on Friday.

The Boys' Story.
Three boys, Richard Davey, Charles Pilon and Wm. Douglas, saw the tragedy, and were called by the crown to give evidence. They say they saw Constantine standing in the car door, apparently quarrelling with an old man, Antonici, standing on the ground below. Antonici threw a piece of coal at Constantine through the open door. Constantine jumped down and grabbed the old man by the arms from behind. Then the prisoner jumped out of another car, picked up a flat stone which had been used as a marker in a game of coppers, and ran towards Constantine. The deceased ran, and Ponzi threw the stone, striking Constantine on the back of the head. The latter staggered and fell to the ground lifeless.

Witnesses for the defence told of seeing two members of the gang with knives in their hands, but the weapons were not used, nor was their use threatened. They admitted the other facts as outlined above. It appeared that the trouble in the gang started when Antonici and a brother of the murdered man began drinking beer together.

Prisoner in Box.
Ponzi's story was that he threw the stone at Constantine when he saw the latter coming towards him with a knife. Ponzi was put in the box as a witness in his own behalf.

DIES ON STREET.
Toronto, Nov. 5.—William T. Buttery, aged 50 years, collapsed in Phoebe street a few steps from his home this morning, and died almost instantly from heart failure. Buttery had been employed as a stableman in the bakery of F. J. Weston & Sons for years.

SOUNDING AUSTRALIA
Deputy Postmaster-General Investigating "All Red" Sentiment.

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—Advices have been received that Dr. R. M. Coulter, C. M. G., the deputy postmaster-general, has arrived at Sydney, N. S. W., and that tomorrow he will commence his negotiations with the Commonwealth Government at Melbourne in regard to the position which Australia is likely to assume towards the all-red line project. After his conference at Melbourne, Dr. Coulter will have to go to Wellington, New Zealand, and will afterwards proceed to South Africa and Great Britain.

FOUR MINERS ENTOMBED
Likely To Suffocate Before Rescue Party Can Reach Them.

Benton, Ill., Nov. 5.—An explosion at the mine of Col. W. P. Bond, three miles west of Benton, late today wrecked the shaft, and as a result four men are entombed.

So terrific was the explosion that a car and pieces of the railroad track were hurled from the bottom to the top of the shaft, more than 600 feet, demolishing a steel tippie.

It is impossible to reach the miners and their fate is unknown. A large force of men are trying to clear away the wreckage, but the work is progressing slowly. Unless the men are reached soon it is believed they will certainly be suffocated.

The names of the entombed miners are George Reed, Patrick Dalley, Percy Stevens and John Holmes.

William Myers, an Owen Sound lineman, came in contact with a live wire and his condition is serious.

SUCCUMBS TO WOUNDS INFLECTED BY COW

Goderich, Nov. 5.—George Levy, who was badly kicked and trampled on by a cow on Monday last, succumbed to his injuries today. An operation was performed on Tuesday to relieve him, but the injuries were too severe to respond to treatment.

The remains were taken to Mitchell for interment by a son who resides in Clinton. He was about 60 years old. The family reside near London.
