PETITIONS FOR DISALLOWANCE.

Appeals to Ottawa for disallowance of the hydro-electric legislation of the last session of the Ontario Legislature seem to be the order of the day. The Toronto Stock Exchange and a number of other financial institutions have sent in petitions, as have also the farmers of the counties of Welland, Lincoln, Wentworth, Peel and Halton. In the petitions the confiscatory nature of the legislation is pointed out, as is also the denial of private rights involved, and the power of disallowance is invoked in protection of the citizen, and for the credit of Canadian good faith, which must inevitably suffer in reputation so long as such legislation remains upon the statute books.

It is not surprising to find Galt among the petitioners. It was because a high court judge gave a decision that that town was not bound to a contract which had been altered after its approval by the ratepayers that the Government introduced and secured the passage of an act declaring that the validity of the contracts as they had been altered should not be open to question and should not be disputed on any ground whatever in any court, but should be held as valid and binding upon the municipal corporations concerned. It is little wonder that the five hundred names on the Galt petition included those of men of both political parties.

As a matter of fact the legislation in question constitutes an attack on the rights of Conservatives and Liberals alike, and there is no reason why it should be discussed in any other than a non-partisan spirit. This is evidently the opinion of that staunch Conservative journal, the Montreal Gazette, which after outlining the facts in connection with the bills relating to the Florence Mining Company and the hydro-electric contracts, comments:

"Legislation to take away from a man his right to have his grievance actually before the courts adjudicated on is rare and liable to be dangerous whenever it is used. That to pass such laws is within the power of the Legislature as declared by judges and admitted by constitutional authorities, does not alter the situation. The Legislature has theoretically the power to say that property which one man has legally won shall be taken from him and given to another. It would not be well, though, that use should be made of it. The wisdom of an enactment is as important as the making of it. The protests against the enactments in question have been widespread and vigorous. Whatever their immediate result, it can be presumed that they will have the effect of making legislators and governments more careful when they are called on to deal with the fundamental of civil freedom, the right of a man when he thinks he is aggrieved to go to the courts and get judgment on his claim in accordance with the law."

CANADA'S CROP ACREAGE.

According to the June bulletin of the Dominion department of agriculture, the prairie provinces are increasing their lead over the older portions of the Dominion in acreage sown, as well as in the production of the leading grains, and are rapidly gaining on them as regards other cereals. The total acreage sown to wheat this year in the whole of Canada is placed at 7,750,000 acres, of which 662,100 acres are in fall and 7,088,900 are in spring wheat. Of the entire wheat area nearly one-half is in Saskatchewan, that province being credited with 3,855,000 acres. Manitoba comes second, with 2,808,000 acres; Ontario third, with 124,700 acres of spring and 581,000 acres of fall wheat, and Alberta fourth with 204,000 acres of spring, and 81,000 acres of fall wheat. Canada's wheat area has increased since last year 1,140,000 acres, and as the area in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta alone increased 1,254,000 acres, there must be a decrease, though not a very heavy one, in the older provinces.

Ontario continues to hold the premier position in oats, 3,142,200 acres of a total of 9,392,000 sown in that grain in the Dominion being in this Province. But it would seem as if the new provinces would soon be found leaders in oats. Saskatchewan this year has

1,847,000 acres in that grain, Quebec 1,574,000 acres, Manitoba 1,390,000 and Alberta 820,000. But while Ontario's oat area increased by 24,000 acres and Quebec's by 32,000 acres, Saskatchewan's increase was 217,000 acres, Manitoba's 68,000 acres, and Alberta's 301,000 acres. In other words, the three prairie provinces provide 1,286,000 of the 1,361,500 acres increase in this grain.

Figures as to the standard condition of the crops on June 15 give Ontario first place as to fall wheat, the percentage being 100.09; Saskatchewan second, 99.34; Manitoba, third, 96.90; Quebec fourth, 93.71; Alberta fifth, 88.27. For spring wheat, Alberta's percentage of standard condition was 99.17, Saskatchewan's 98.90, Manitoba's 98.30, Quebec's 90.13, Ontario's 86.23. Weather conditions may, of course, have already considerably altered this standing.

Ontario still leads all the provinces in barley acreage. This Province is credited with 721,500 acres; Manitoba, however, is not far behind, having 656,000 acres to its credit. Then come, in the order named, Alberta, with 186,000 acres, Saskatchewan with 135,000 and Quebec with 108,000 acres. The total barley acreage of the Dominion is placed at 1,564,900 acres.

As yet the western provinces do not cut much of a figure in the growing of rye, peas, mixed grains, hay and clover, even the Maritime Provinces making a better showing.

MR. BORDEN AND THE DREAD-NOUGHTS.

The various Conservative journals and other super-loyal critics of the Canadian Government, including the Premier of Ontario, have overlooked another sinner. According to the report of the Dominion Day celebration in Old London, as given in the Standard of Empire, Mr. R. L. Borden, the Conservative leader, referring to the resolution passed in the Canadian Parliament, actually said that "the resolution in the form in which it was passed, while its terms might not upon their surface seem as significant at the moment as the offer of one or two Dreadnoughts, would have been, laid down a permanent policy for the Dominion of Canada upon which both parties united and which would serve as a more practical purpose than any such offer of Dreadnoughts." Evidently Mr. Borden realizes his responsibility as the leader of one of the political parties in the Dominion. The critics do not seem to realize anything—do not even realize that in condemning the Government for its course in the matter of aid to the British navy they are condemning their own leader.

THE ART OF HOLIDAYING.

BETTER THAN DREADNOUGHTS.

The militant Imperialists of Toronto and Winnipeg will have to pass a vote of censure upon his Excellency the Governor-General. While they have been asserting day in and day out that Canada has been negligent of her duty, or, to use the unfortunate expression of Sir Hugh Graham that "for long years Canada had been sponging on the motherland for protection," Earl Grey has been preaching in London the truth that Canada has already done her share, and is prepared to do more as the necessity arises.

The Governor-General is the spokesman of the people of Canada, irrespective of party, for he knows no party; and when he is able to thus endorse the policy of the Canadian Parliament, under both political parties, he is doing a public service to Canada and to the empire at large.

A GOOD STROKE OF BUSINESS.

The final acceptance of the Franco-Canadian trade convention by the French chambers has caused the trade experts at Washington to sit up and take notice. They have convinced themselves that under the new arrangement Canadian makers will have a decided advantage over their American competitors on the market for harvesting machines, in which a trade is actually done. Out of \$1,000 of such machines imported into France in 1907 there were 58,000 of American make and 11,000 of Canadian. In the new situation made by the Canadian agreement, Canadian makers will have an advantage of \$2.95 on a mower, \$4.82 on a reaper, \$8.20 on a binder and \$1.93 on a hay-rake. This assurance from Washington, based on the reports of consular agents, will not cause any regret in this country. If it leads American amalgamations to build new plants in Canada or add to their present ones to get the benefit of liberal trade measures, they will be made as welcome as hundreds of their kind who are here already.

HARRY THAW'S MOTHER CHARGES A PLOT

Declares White's Former Chums Are Behind Opposition to Son.

New York, July 21.—Harry Thaw's mother today issued her pamphlet, in which she attacks the courts, District Attorney Jerome and all others connected in any way either with the prosecution of her son for the murder of Stanford White, or with keeping him in the asylum at Matteawan since he escaped conviction on the plea of insanity. She has mailed copies to many newspapers.

The title is "The Secret Unveiled." "When I returned from Europe," she says, "I found a cowardly combination of men of professional standing, with disappointed blackmailers, perjurers and others all working in the interest of the very rich companions of Stanford White, to prevent a trial which would result in exposure. They set to work to blacken the reputation of my son, an average young man with a chivalrous nature. Then the entire family, living and dead, was attacked by slanderous falsehoods."

"Pretended He Had Delusions." "They pretended my son had delusions regarding those three infamous demons used by Stanford White and his companions in their disgusting orgies for secret assaults on little girls whose bodies and souls he ruined. Judge from these unlooked-for disclosures and from the powerful influence of these miserable degenerates of the corruption behind this persecution."

She declares Thaw's confinement in Matteawan "illegal imprisonment that would wreck most men with fortitude." Criticizing the court, she says "five appellate judges handed down three separate opinions, two of which must be wrong."

"The opinion of Judge Dowling was based on the testimony of one of the most unreliable witnesses in the case." "There could be no denunciation too severe for the Russian judge who would dare sustain a sentence so unjust and cruel and so violative of every constitutional safeguard."

Doctors Say He's Sane. "Every doctor who has examined my son, 17 in all, say, 'Thaw was and is sane.' He never had any delusions and no paranoia whatever. Nothing is more obvious. Jerome also believes him sane, or he would not have so persistently sought to prevent a hearing on his sanity."

"What I quote is significant, and makes Jerome's attitude since the acquittal incomprehensible, unless he is influenced."

No attempt is made at a real review of the case. Mrs. Thaw's only quotes from the arguments used in her son's defense.

FRISBIE DOESN'T SEEM TO WORRY

Talks With Other Prisoners, But Not About Crime.

Port Huron, Mich., July 21.—It is possible that the police court examination of Sam Frisbie, who is charged with the murder of Louis Moore, of Cleveland, will not take place on Friday, Attorney Joseph Walsh, one of the lawyers retained by the defendant, is now in Detroit, where he is engaged in a case, and unless the suit is concluded before Friday an adjournment of the Frisbie examination will be asked for.

Frisbie still remains silent in the county jail. He talks with the other prisoners in the upper corridor, but not about the Frisbie murder which resulted in the suicide of Frank Riberka, who does not seem to be greatly worried over the outcome of his examination and trial.

In a letter to the local officers, Deputy Sheriff W. B. Moore, who is looking up Frisbie's past in Cleveland, states that he has met with good success in getting Frisbie's work with the attorney employed by the Rosenberg family and when he returns he will have the complete history of Frisbie, together with other facts that might be valuable.

Since the first letter received by Frisbie from his mother, the prisoner has received two other missives, in which his parents express their implicit trust in him.

THE BEAUTIFYING OF THE CAPITAL

Plans for a Park That Will Rival Any on the Continent.

Ottawa, July 21.—Members of the Ottawa improvement commission and representatives of the city council had a conference with Sir Wilfrid Laurier this morning relative to the carrying out of the commission's plans for the beautifying of the capital. Sir Wilfrid heartily concurred in the proposal of the commission for making a public park of Nepean Point on the high bluff overlooking the Ottawa River, near the foot of the Rideau Canal, and connecting it with Major Hill Park. A magnificent driveway, starting from the Dufferin and Sappers bridges in the centre of the city, and following the line of the canal and Ottawa River, will run around Nepean Point and on to Sussex street at Bingham Square, near Sir John A. Macdonald's old residence at Besscliffe. From there it will follow Sussex street to Rockcliffe Park, the whole constituting a driveway rivaling for scenic beauty that of the city of the continent. The space between Dufferin and Sappers bridges fronting the postoffice will be filled in, and the statue of the late prime minister will be erected. Sir Wilfrid suggested this morning that the statue of D'Arcy McGee, provided for in the estimates of last session, might be placed there. With the new million-dollar Grand Trunk Hotel and new central station also bordering on this plaza this morning, the beautifying of the Parliament Buildings and Major Hill Park, the centre of the capital will present an imposing appearance.

EXPERT'S OPINION ON PIRATES' CHANCES

Noted Sporting Editor Says Will Win and Praises Gibson.

Sporting Editor the Dispatch, Pittsburgh, Pa.

In my opinion Pittsburgh will win the 1909 National League pennant. Detroit should repeat for the second time in the American League. Pittsburgh has everything that goes to make a championship club. In the first place, Gibson is one of the best and bravest catchers in the big leagues. Furthermore, like the majority of the Pirates, he is a consistent hitter. The pitching staff, as it is working at present, class with any in the league and has a shade on everything but Chicago. The infield, with a man of Wagner's calibre, cannot but be strong. The work of the first defense to date justifies belief that it will not break, though composed of Wagner and three youngsters. The outfield is the best in the league. It is questionable if the sensational garden of the Tigers has anything on Fred Clarke and his two helpers. Add to this the all-round hitting ability of the club and the defensive cunning and inside baseball, which Clarke, Wagner and Leach have drilled into the team, and it is hard to see how any one can head the Pirates this year.

Detroit's ultimate success rests on the pitching staff. If Mullin and Donavan come back there will be nothing to it. The team is stronger in every department than last year. In my opinion the Athletics are playing beyond their speed. Connie Mack is one of the finest pitching staffs ever collected, but there is too much green material to stand the strain of a tight finish.
