

COMET DIDN'T WORRY DETROIT

Swept by Comet's Tail, But the Residents Generally Merely Curious.

MANY HALLEY PARTIES

Roofs of Tall Buildings Much in Demand—Many Pupils in School Kept at Home by Worried Mothers.

Detroit, May 19.—There were as many tales of the comet's tail. Local comet-fanciers with a taste for human experience went about sniffing the air in luxurious inhalations for a whiff of cyanogen at 5 o'clock. By two hours later they were tired of it, and, encouraged by a shroud of moonlight, turned their attention to the sky.

Comet Parties Given.

Men and women armed with spy-glasses stood on the tops of apartment houses and office buildings and strolled down town to look through telescopes; they pored over books in the public libraries and interviewed the weather men with edifying persistence; they made a stab at praying against their sapient every-day judgments, reconciled themselves coolly to everlasting perdition and gave after-theatre comet parties at cafes and clubs.

The conscientious beauty lovers looked long and hard for flame-hued waves of light to flush the sky; for golden meteoric showers, and for the burnished blue and dark pink ribbons of an aurora borealis.

The office buildings confined admission to the roof for observation purposes to their tenants. Many disappointed comet hunters were turned away from the majestic building, the roof entrance being closed at eight o'clock.

Only Majestic Light.

About nine o'clock last night an excited man dashed into the lobby of the Ford building and dragged out the night watch to look at the comet. It was only the light over the majestic building, the resemblance being harmless and unobtrusive. Yet came in for a share of due attention.

At the foot of Third street, quite a party of Halleyites waited for signs and wonders until late hour.

The "wireless boys" on top of the chamber of commerce building, no word of greeting from the cometary spirit in the course of passage, although they were, metaphorically, "right at the switch."

A small St. Louis dealer declared he had seen the comet looking like a jellyfish, and that it crossed to Windsor. He also said that it didn't go very fast, after all.

The wonder of interest shown in the schools and orphan asylums for the most part is traced to previous instruction upon the unswerving paths of comets and their ethereal nature. Where any doubt is expressed by the juvenile Yankee portion of the community, it hinges upon the interesting possibility of school-keeping being at an end forever and all the time.

SQUADRON OF ROYALTY TO FOLLOW CASKET

Edward's Funeral Friday Will Furnish a Magnificent Spectacle.

London, May 19.—The official programme of Friday's ceremonial has been issued. It is exceedingly detailed, and would fill five or six columns of a newspaper. In brief, it is as follows:

"The coffin will be transferred from the catafalque at Westminster Hall to a gun carriage at 9:45 a.m. The royal regalia will be placed on the coffin, and a procession will then be formed. It will be headed by a multitude of men prominent in the British and foreign military and naval services. The flames and ranks being fully set forth in the programme, and massed bands and royal suites. Immediately behind the gun carriage will come Prince Louis of Battenberg, King Edward's charger will come next, led, and then the royal standard. Behind will come a cavalcade of royal personages, King George leading. The Kaiser will ride on his right and the Duke of Connaught on his left, a few paces to the rear."

"In ranks of three there will ride the kings of Norway, Greece, Spain, Bulgaria, Denmark, Portugal and Belgium, the Austrian heir apparent, the Ottoman heir apparent, Prince Fushimi, of Japan; Grand Duke Michael, representing the Czar; the Duke of Anjou, representing the King of Italy; Prince Reisch, of Bavaria; the Duke of Sparta, the Crown Prince of Roumania, Prince Henry, of the Netherlands; Duke of Albrecht, of Wurtemberg; the Crown Prince of Serbia, Prince Henry of Prussia; the Grand Duke of Hesse, the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, the Crown Prince of Saxony, the Grand Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, the Prince of Waldeck-Pyrmont, Mohammed Ali, of Egypt; Tse-tse, uncle of the Emperor of China; Prince Charles, of Sweden; Prince Albert of Schleswig-Holstein, Prince Arthur of Connaught, Prince Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, the Duke of Albany, the Duke of Cumberland, Prince Alexander of Teck, the Duke of Teck, Prince Francis of Baden, Prince Andrew of Greece, Prince Philip of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, Prince of Bulgaria, Prince of Greece, Prince of Greece, the Duc d'Alencon, Comte d'Eu and three other Orleans princes, the Crown Prince of Siam, Prince Leopold of Coburg and Prince Wladimir."

Then will come a coach, in which the Queen Mother, the Dowager (Czarina and Princess Louise and Princess Victoria will ride. Another coach will follow, occupied by Queen Mary, the Queen of Norway, the Duke of Cornwall and his sister, Princess Mary. Then there will be four coaches filled with princesses belonging or immediately related to the British royal family, another carrying a Chinese princess and the members of the Chinese mission, all the foregoing being royal. Mr. Roosevelt and M. Pichon, the French foreign minister, will ride side by side in the eighth carriage of 12 of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, Prince of Strathmore, Sir C. Reid and Mr. Jones, representing Canada, Australia and New Zealand, respectively, will ride together in the ninth carriage. Officers and members of the royal suite, members of the royal suite, will be followed by a detachment of the London fire brigade.

The foregoing list takes no notice of the numerous high placed officers who will precede, surround and follow the gun carriage, nor of the considerable bodies of cavalry, artillery and infantry heading and closing the procession.

Quebec and Newfoundland Designs Approved.

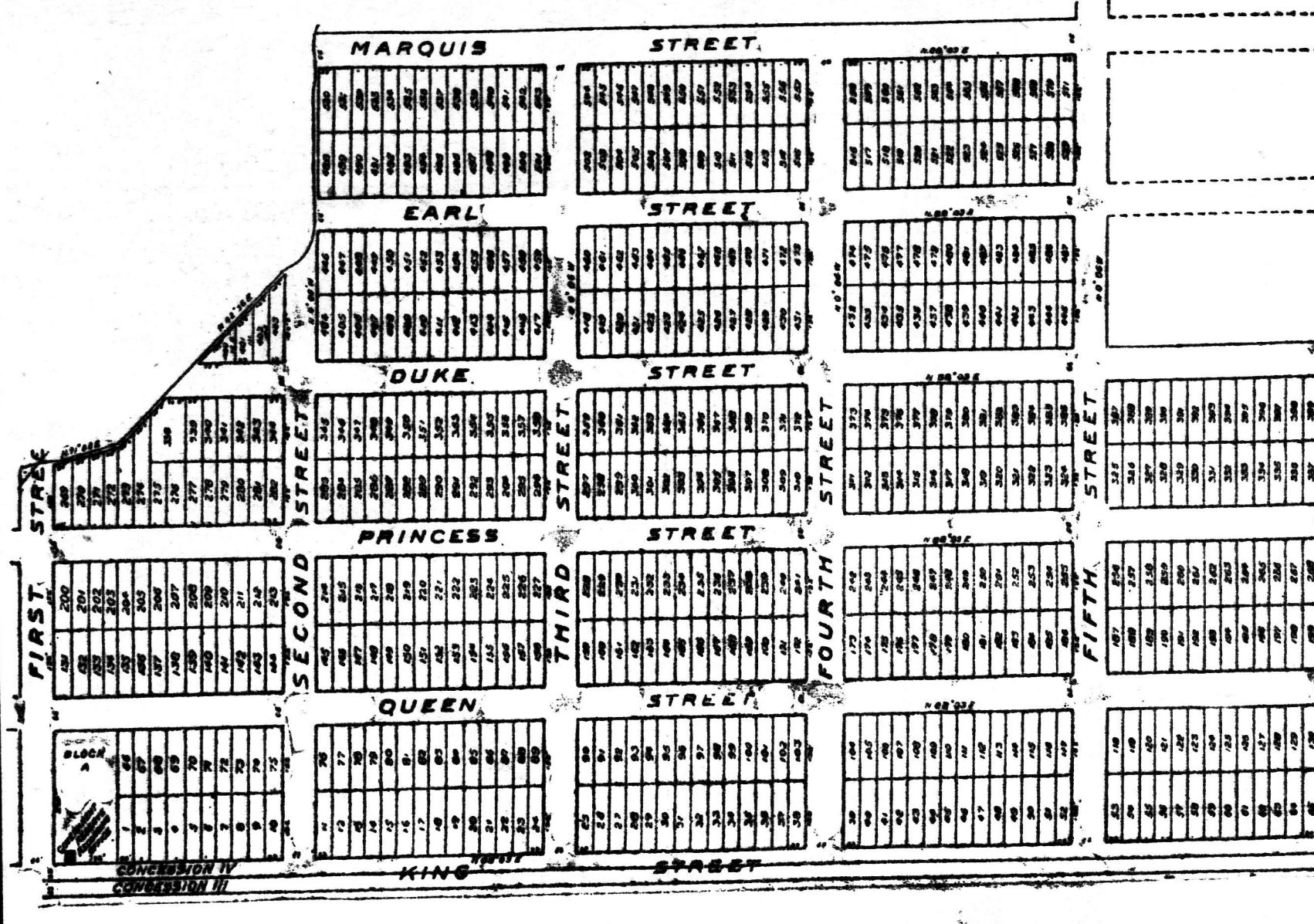

Premier and Lady Mores were privileged to visit the throne room prior to the removal of Edward VII's body to Westminster Hall. They took with them a number of the wealth of calligraphies and English violet inscribed.

"In Grateful Remembrance from Newfoundland, His Oldest Colony." The wreath was made under the supervision of Lady Mores, and will be the official tribute from Newfoundland.
