

## WATERWAYS COMMIISSON BACKS CONMEE'S BILL

Engineer Coste Says That Canal From Winnipeg to Lake Superior Is Feasible.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, April 4.- That the proposed canal from Lake Superior to Lake Winnipeg, as contemplated in Mr. James Conmee's bill, now under considera-tion by the sub-committee of the Commons railways and canals committee, is feasible from an engineering standpoint, that it would provide for the development of about one millionhorsepower in the district served, and that it must sooner or later be necessary if Canada is to preserve the grain carrying trade of this country, was in substance the evidence given before the sub-committee by Mr. Louis Coste, of the Canadian section of the International Waterways Commission. Mr. Coste, speaking as an engineer, said that it would be possible to construct the canal along the proposed route from Lake Superior to Lake Winnipeg, with a depth of 7 to 9 feet, and a width of 40 feet. He did not think there would be any difficulty in creating adequate storage basins to carry the canal over the Height of Land 50 miles from Lake Superior. Estimates as to the total cost were, he said, of course, only vaguely approximate as yet, but he did not think the whole canal would cost over twenty millions. He believed that ultimately the graincarrying trade of the west would demand the extension of the canal right through to Edmonton. He thought the waterways commission should be safely trusted to protect the in-terests of the public in regard to navigation and power rights.
