FORTY THOUSAND SCHOOL BOYS TO ATTEND SUMMER CAMPS

Minister of Militia Arranging for Big Scheme of Annual Training for Cadet Corps and Boy Scout Organizations of Canada. Physical and Military Training To Be the Features.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, Dec. 31 .- The Globe tomordispatch from Ottawa: Ottawa, Dec. 31 -Undeterred by the recent criticisms of Mr. Bourassa anent the ultra-militariness of the militia department, Hon. Col. Hughes is arranging a radideparture in regard to the military training of Canada's future citizens. A scheme has been approved by the Government providing for the military training next July of forty thousand school boys in all parts of Canada at instructional camps. The Minister of Militia, after consulting with his cabinet colleagues, has embarked on a comprehensive developada, believing that on this depends to a large extent the future efficiency of the militia forces, and that when rightly understood it will meet with general approval as being justifiable not only on military but also because it will conduce to the physical, moral and mental efficiency of the youth of Canestimates for the coming fiscal year for the uniforming of some forty thousand school cadets, and for one week's training for them during the holiday season in July at regimental or district headquarters' camps.

One Week's Drill.

Each school or municipality will be asked to send a detachment of boys to the local district training camp for one week. Instruction this year will be in the elements of military and either the school teachers or qualified conditions of actual service.

District Camps.

For the most part the district camps will be at some central point within each county, possibly the county town, though details have still to be worked out, and the size and location of camps will vary according to varying requirements. The cadets will be furnished with tents or other suitable sleeping accommodations, and with complete camp equipments. A serviceable but inexpensive uniform will be given to each cadet. The ages of the boys eligible for attendance at the camps will be from 10 or 11 years to 16 or 17 years. Boy Scout work, which is now becoming worldwide in popularity, will, of course, be one of the features of the work this sum-

Hon, Col. Hughes is a firm believer in the value of military training for every boy in the country, as fitting himnot only for service if required in the defence of his country, but also making him a better citizen in every way, disciplined, alert, upstanding and patriotic. It is expected that the scheme above outlined will give an immense impetus to the cadet movement throughout the Dominion. As she approached the stairway leading to the basement she was suddenly taken with a fainting spell, and plunged heading to the cement floor below.

Severe Scalp Wound Found. Miss Lovell ran to her assistance, but when she reached her Mrs. Anderson had recovered sufficiently to walk up to her room, although she required assistance. An East London physician was called and dressed a deep sealp wound, but the patient then appeared to be in no very serious con-

At noon, however, she lost consciousness and two other surgeons were called, who ordered her removal to Victoria Hospital. An operation was performed, and pressure relieved from the brain by removing a portion of the skull, which had been fractured at the
