Big Crowd. A bill for the control and administration of cold storage warehouses was introduced by the Minister of Agriculture.

It aims to discourage, postpone poisoning by limiting the time by regulation that meats, fish, eggs and dairy articles may be kept in a condition of chilled inactivity for sale when the markets are right and the prices are to the satisfaction of the cold storage if not to the consumer.
