YOUNG TORIES ARE TOLD OF CANADIAN PROSPERITY

Hon. F. H. Keefer, K.C., Explodes Blue Ruin Arguments of Fellow-Speakers.

BUDGET IS ATTACKED

Many Prominent Speakers At Banquet of Macdonald-Cartier Club.

Embryo Conservative politicians from the University of Western Ontario assembled 200 strong in the Tecumseh House last evening to mark the birth of the Macdonald-Cartier Club, an organization established to promote Tory principles at the college.

Eloquence teeming with superlatives of the traditional political vintage featured the feast. Speakers from the Ontario legislature and the Federal House were specially imported for the occasion, and each did his best to instill the minds of the students with ancient Conservative doctrine.

Notable among these were Hon. F. H. Keefer, the new secretary for Northern Ontario; Wilfrid S. Haney, the boy orator from Sarnia; Sir Adam Beck, E. R. Dennis, Dr. Raymond Morand of Windsor, W. H. Barnum, K.C. of Aylmer; L. J. Ladner, M.P. of South Vancouver, and several student speakers.

As anticipated, the budget speech of Hon. Mr. Robb was subjected to general analysis by Frank White, M.P. Mr. Haney, too, made some caustic reference to it. Neither, however, appeared very familiar with its import, and contented themselves with employing such phrases as "national ruination" and "acute depression," apparently intending to convey the impression that the budget proposals were not to their liking.

Opportunity in Ontario. Hon. Mr. Keefer, however, administered a knockout blow to members of the blue-ruin brigade which preceded him. After Mr. Haney had finished telling the young men a doleful tale of industrial depression in Ontario and the lack of opportunity for the youth of Canada, Mr. Keefer repudiated all the Sarnia member's accusations. Greater opportunity existed in Ontario than any other section of the world, he claimed.

Another ironical touch was given the affair when Professor R. E. Freeman of the University of Western Ontario, in the most effective and interesting speech of the lot, pleaded with the students for "unbiased thinking" and "freedom from political propaganda."

No one party, he said, has a monopoly on vice, patriotism, corruption, duty. There is good and bad in both. It remained for young men to study the principles of both and conscientiously make a decision as to which it is proper to ally themselves with. Prejudice, bigotry and preconceived opinion should not enter into their deliberations.

Mr. Haney evidently disagreed with Professor Freeman, as did Dr. Morand and others. The Sarnia speaker stated there was no party like the Conservative party. Every person not a Conservative was necessarily a low type of mentality, in Mr. Haney's opinion. He referred with poignant regret to the alleged departure of young Canadians for the United States. He sympathized with them, claiming no opportunity existed in Ontario owing to the awful things done by the federal government.

Claims Panacea. Of course, a panacea for the manifold ills which beset the country could be found. It was the Conservative party to which Mr. Haney promised to be true for better or for worse. The Conservative party had never made a mistake, Mr. Haney declared. It was the only party that could be trusted to take the reins of government and dispense justice, equity and opportunity to all.

Neil Miller, founder of the Macdonald-Cartier Club, and E. R. Dennis, president of the Western Ontario Conservative Association, spoke of the function of the newly-organized association. Robert Shaw-Wood, president, gave a brief address and introduced the speakers. He presented Mr. Haney and said the latter was better qualified than anyone to address the students because he was a young man himself.

Mr. Haney is possessed of a sense of humor. It is his most striking characteristic. That is why his attempted condemnation of all other political parties fell a bit short. His remarks were funny and drew laughter and his criticism of Liberalism was received in the same spirit.

Duty of Young. "It is the duty of the young men to ally themselves with this club," Mr. Haney said in one of his serious moments. "This organization is to make young men think for themselves and uphold the principles of Toryism."

Professor Freeman said when he received news of the club's foundation it was with mixed feelings. "I wondered what was this thing that has arisen among us," he said. "It has been formed without the inspiration of the faculty. But the crowning merit and underlying significance of the club is that it was a spontaneous thing. The extraordinary outburst of zeal on the part of the students indicated that they wanted to study political thought and conditions. This was a good thing. The country's greatest danger is that too many people in it cannot think properly."

"A young man cannot alienate himself from politics. Be it virtuous or corrupt, politics is a living, tumultuous reflection of life. A scholar must be free in his political thought and should not mingle with political propaganda. He must be untrammelled and not align himself with any one party."

Wilson Speaks. George Bond proposed a toast to the city and Ald. Jack Greer replied. Dr. Cameron Wilson, president of the London Conservative Association, said the ideal of the newly-formed club was to unite in fellowship the English and French-speaking peoples of Quebec and Ontario. He said all the country needed at the present time was one policy, Conservatism. He advised the people to get out and pray for light. Conditions were so bad, owing to the terrible legislation of the Liberals, that light was needed. Alfred Hoad proposed a toast to the local provincial and federal mem-

bers. Frank White, M.P., in reply, said politics was what the people made it. Corruption had crept into public life to an alarming extent all over the world, and the state of affairs revealed at Toronto indicated dishonesty had come into the legislature.

"The budget would seem to indicate that it is a step in the fulfillment of the 1919 Liberal platform," Mr. White said. "It is hard to say what effects it will have. The damage will probably be great to manufacturers. The new tariff will still private enterprise and create additional unemployment."

Dr. Raymond Moran, introduced by Rev. Father Brennan, principal of the Catholic School of Philosophy, is an old boy of the university. He, too, stressed the ideal of French and English unity in Canada, and closed his address with a quotation from Cartier in French, which was enthusiastically received.

Lauds Sir Adam. Hon. Mr. Keefer, in his opening remarks, characterized Sir Adam Beck as one of the greatest living Canadians, and summarized the hydro-knight's achievements. He rapped Mr. Haney's blue ruin talk effectively. Canada has thrived out of all proportion during the past four years, he said, and added the opportunities galore awaited young men in North-western Ontario.

Mr. Keefer outlined the tremendous resources of the north country in minerals, fisheries, forests, furs and farms. He stated that he regretted that Northern and Northwest-ern Ontario had not received the advertising it deserved.

A splendid tribute was paid Sir Adam Beck by Mr. Keefer, and Mr. White also lauded the provincial member. When the latter arose to speak he was greeted with applause and cheers.

Sir Adam Beck said the country needed new blood at this time more than it ever had in the past. He referred to the scandals in the United States, Newfoundland and Toronto as "a shame and a crime."

"We have scandal in as filthy state here in Ontario as any other country," he said.

Sir Adam then discussed all projects with which he had been identified with since entering politics. He said London had always been prosperous. He outlined the progress made in distribution of hydro power throughout Ontario and mentioned the benefits to be derived from the proposed Bygon Sanatorium, the Institute of Public Health, the London and Port Stanley Railway, and the city water supply.
