HONOR DELEGATES AT CANADIAN CLUB

Dinner Is Given to Leading Educationists of the Dominion.

Canon Emile Chartier, vice-rector of the University of Montreal, was the principal speaker last night at a dinner in the Tecumseh house tendered by the Canadian club to visiting delegates to the opening ceremony at Western University.

Though representing a university differing in creed, he stressed the importance of a closer rapprochement between the people of Quebec and Ontario, and pleaded for a better understanding between the men and women who spoke the French and the English languages in Canada.

Justice Riddell, who appeared as representing Toronto university, the bar association, and the judiciary, and who was introduced as "one needing no introduction," urged on the club the extreme value of university training not only on the individual, but also on the country at large. While he was ready to admit that several great men had been without the benefits of university education, he thought they would have been greater men if they had had better opportunities of education.

A. Stanley McKenzie, president of the university of Dalhousie, Nova Scotia, the last speaker of the evening, representing the universities of the maritime provinces, echoed many of the addresses which had been made earlier in the day at the opening ceremony and congratulated the club on having a university so well backed up by public opinion in the community in which it stood.

Col. Ibbotson Leonard, who presided, brought the congratulations of the royal military college, of which he was a representative, to the governors, on the opening of the new buildings. Owing to the very brief time at the disposal of the club, the delegates were due at the Y. M. C. A. for the formation of the procession to the Winter Garden at a quarter to eight, only three speakers were called upon, and they spoke merely to convey their congratulations to the university.

LONDONER HAS MEDAL OF KING'S MARRIAGE

Rev. Mark Turnbull Holds Treasured Piece Over 100 Years Old.

Rev. Mark Turnbull, former rector at Christ Church, Port Stanley, and now residing on Cheapside street, city, is the proud possessor of a gold medal, marking the anniversary of King Charles' England's marriage to a German princess, over 150 years old.

This medal, of which only twenty were made for the members of the royal family, was presented to Mr. Turnbull's son by the governor of Panama, when the former was travelling in that country.

Mr. Turnbull has had many offers from different concerns in the United States and Canada, who wish to purchase the treasure, but the owner has ignored all offers, keeping the medal as a keepsake.

Mr. Turnbull, who has had many adventurous experiences in Mexico and other southern countries, in the early days, when bandits overran the country, can readily recall the numerous rebellions and uprisings which happened during his visit in these countries.

He also has one of the largest collections of stamps in Canada, collecting most of them from the different countries he has travelled in.

Despite the fact that he has passed the four score years and ten mark long ago, Mr. Turnbull still retains his love for the outdoors and his garden.

BOY FALLS FROM CAR WHILE CHASING BOOK

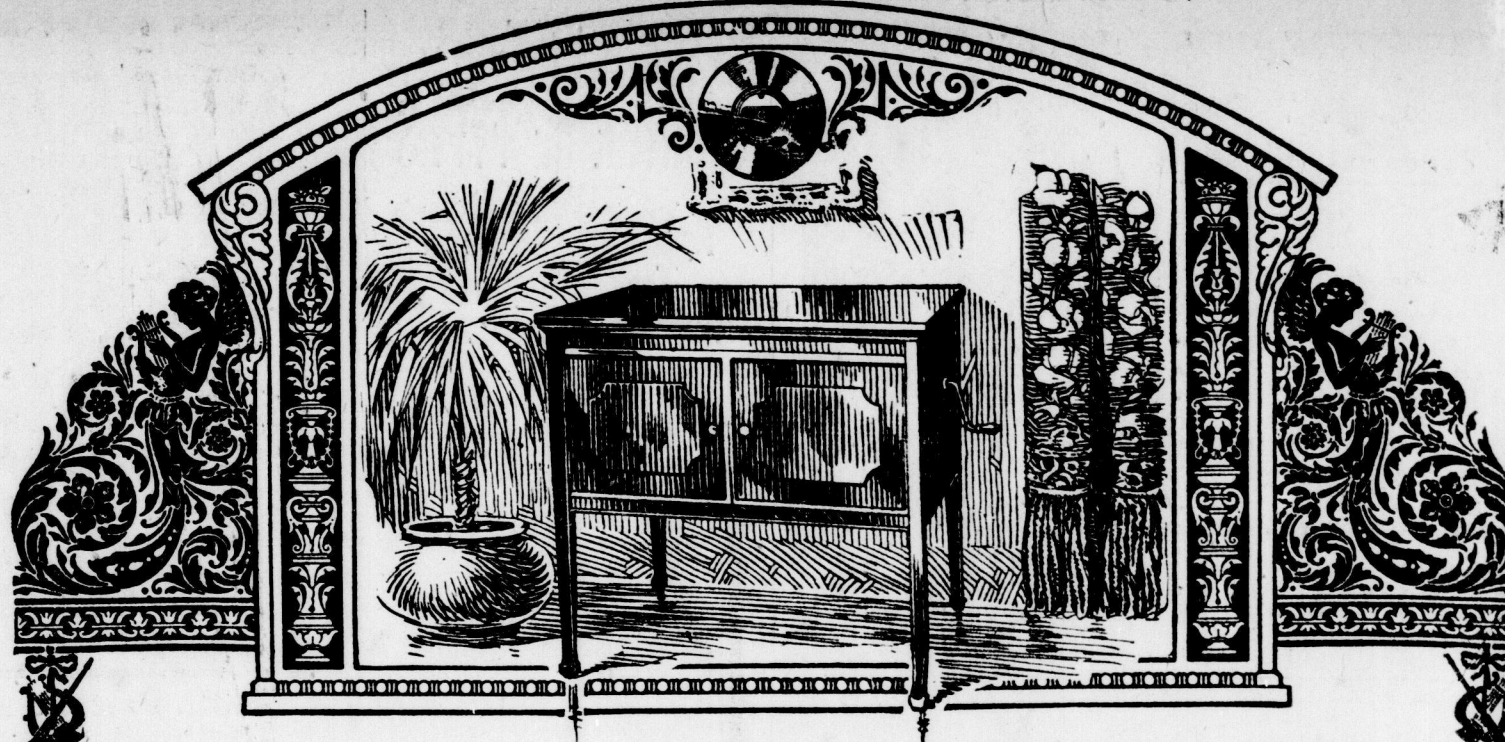
Falling off the moving 420 L. and P. S. train to recover a book which he had dropped, was the experience of a little lad from Glanworth yesterday.

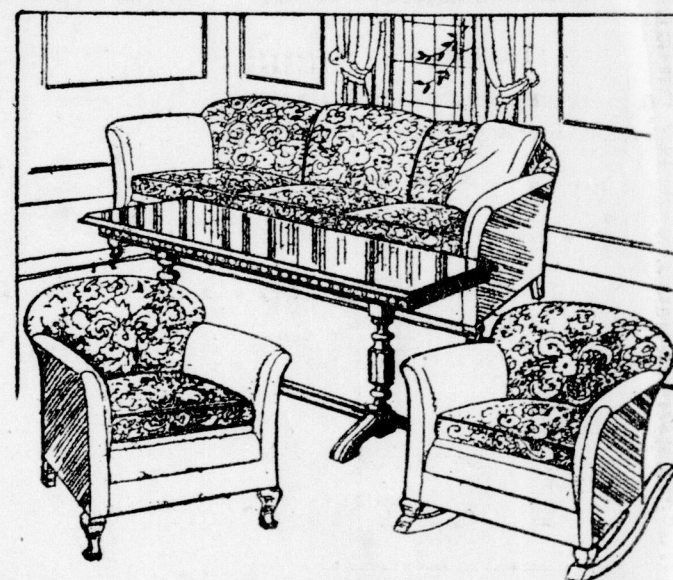
