DRAW CLOSE TO LEADERS.

Red Sox Dropped Two Games to St. Louis and Detroit Won Two From New York.

The race in both the American and National Leagues was tightened yesterday. The Boston Red Sox, leaders in the former circuit, dropped both games of their double header to St. Louis while Detroit won two from New York. Thus the Tigers and Browns both drew closer to the top. In the Tenor circuit the Braves trounced the Pirates twice, while Brooklyn won a single game from St. Louis. The margin between the Braves and Dodgers is now only ten points. The Phillies also won and are right up in the running for the National League honors.

American League.

At Boston—The Red Sox ran into disaster yesterday when St. Louis trounced them twice. The scores were 5 to 3 and 8 to 2. In the opening three of the leading pitchers of the Boston team were used—Leonard, Ruth and Mays. Davenport opposed them and though outlasted, he kept his hits scattered with the exception of one inning. In the second game Boston again used three twirlers—Shore Wyckoff and Jones. Groom opposed them. The Boston trio were found for thirteen hits while Groom allowed only six.

At Pittsburgh—The Braves gained on the Dodgers yesterday when they twice defeated the Pirates. The scores were 6 to 1 and 9 to 5. Tyler pitched the first game for Boston and held Pittsburgh to eight hits which only netted one run. He also worked in the second game and lasted until the eighth when he gave way to Hughes after the Pirates had staged a four-run rally, and tied the score. The Braves then hammered out nine runs and won. Outfielder Magee, of the Braves, made his first error of the season in the second game when he fumbled Minchman's single.

At Chicago—Eppa Rixey—of the Phillies held the Cubs to six hits yesterday while the visitor were pounding Vaughn and Prendergast for seventeen. The result was a 8 to 3 victory for the champions. Errors were responsible for the two Cub runs. The New York players coming to the Cubs in exchange for Zimmerman did not arrive in time to take part in the game.

At Cincinnati—Though the Giants did not make as many hits as the Reds yesterday they used them to better advantage and won the second game of the series by 3 to 2. McCarty, the ex-Brooklyn catcher, made his first appearance behind the bat for the Giants and caught a good game.

At St. Louis—The Cards gained an early lead on the Dodgers yesterday, but the latter staged a five-run rally in the eighth and won 7 to 2. The league leaders used three pitchers, while the locals had four in operation.

Harry Pulliam, late president of the National League, once remarked: "Never take anything for granted in baseball," and Pulliam was right, as the standing of the clubs in both major leagues attests.

A week ago it looked as though the Dodgers and Red Sox had almost clinched the burning in their respective leagues. Their owners already were deciding what they would do with the world series gold. And then came the terrible awakening. In just seven days' play, the once-comfortable lead of the Brooklynites has shriveled to a matter of ten points, with the Braves thundering along at a good clip.

And, "If the Dodgers once lose the lead they are through; they won't come back," declares the baseball sharps. "The Ebbetts crowd is not a team of fighters. It cannot come up from the rear. Should the Dodgers drop to second, the fighting for first will be between the Braves and the Phillies."

Just a few days ago the Red Sox had acquired such a lead that it seemed that they were "in" and then the Tigers walloped them twice, and the Browns followed it up by doing out a double beating, which has had the effect of tightening the race again.

The Tigers, spurring as never before this season, are only three games behind the league leaders, with the Browns ensconced in third place, four games to the bad.
