GOLDWIN SMITH.

A brilliant historian and political controversialist arrived in this city last evening in the person of Prof. Goldwin Smith, M.A., LL.D., who was born at Reading, Berkshire, on August 13, 1823, and was educated at Eton and Oxford. He gained, in 1842, the Hertford Scholarship, and in 1845 the scholarship founded by Dean Leake. In the latter year he graduated B.A. as first-class in classics, and subsequently he proceeded to the degree of M.A. He gained the Chancellor's prize for Latin Verse, 1845; for the Latin Essay, 1846; on "Quædam Jursi Malitiam apud veteres Græcos exponebat" for the English Essay, 1847, the subject being "The Political and Social Benefits of the Reformation in England." In 1847 he was elected a Fellow of University College, where he acted for some time as tutor; and in 1851 he was called to the bar at Lincoln's Inn, but he has never practised law. In 1850 he was appointed by the Government Assistant Secretary of the Royal Commission that was charged with the duty of inquiring into the state, studies, discipline, and revenues of the University of Oxford. He was the Secretary to the second Oxford Commission, which effected many alterations in the constitution and government of the University, and was a member of the Popular Education Commission appointed in 1868. P. O. OFFICIALS' SALARIES.
The announcement that the reductions in the provincial allowances of the Post-office clerks cannot be altered until the next session, because the vote had passed the House, leads to another aspect of the question. We do not conceive that the point could not even yet be strained, and the percentages granted as formerly, and we trust that sufficient pressure will be brought to bear upon the present Postmaster-General to induce him to change the ill-adviced action of his predecessor. But we wish to point out to the Department on this occasion that they have throughout treated this city unfairly, a state of affairs existing which can be witnessed in no other city of the same size in Canada. These amounts have been granted by Parliament and should have been expended. Yet what are the facts? A Wonderful Milk Record for one Month.—The Holstein-Friesian cow "Amazonia" of the "Herald," which was purchased in 1881, has just completed a most remarkable milk record for one month. She calved on July 1st, and from the 15th of July she gave an average of 60 lbs. of milk per day, or 600 lbs. in 10 days.
