## TOWN COUNCIL HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING

Town Officials Appointed  
Protest Against Election of  
Councillor David Sansom

### INVESTIGATION

The Town Council held their  
annual meeting on Tuesday evening  
His Worship Mayor Murray presid-  
ing over a full board.

The minutes of the previous meet-  
ing were read and confirmed.

A communication from the Can-  
ada Foundry Company regarding  
balance of account was referred to  
Finance Committee.

Communication from Chas. S. O.  
Crocket requesting electric light  
connection and other matters was  
referred to Electric Light Committee.

Communication asking for contri-  
bution for the Cartier Memorial  
Fund was ordered filed as was a  
communication regarding the Chin-  
ese Famine Fund.

A petition was received from A.  
Martin, M. D., protesting the elec-  
tion of Councillor Sansom and laid  
on table.

Petition from Archd McKenzie  
on behalf of the residents of Union  
Street was referred to Public Prop-  
erty and Streets Committee.

The petition of S. Laughlin re-  
garding insurance on Electric Light  
plant and other town property was  
referred to Finance Committee.

The Town Clerk submitted by-  
laws of several towns covering mov-  
ing picture shows which were laid  
on table.

Petition received from the  
butchers of the town regarding the  
licensing of people who come into  
town peddling beef and was refer-  
red to Police and Licensing Com-  
mittee.

A number of petitions for Livery,  
Trucking, Cab licenses etc., were  
referred to Police and License Com-  
mittee.

## OPENING OF NAVI- GATION ON RIVER

Canada Arrives Monday and  
Reports Going Through  
Heavy Ice at Gaspé

### REGULAR SAILINGS

The Steamship "Canada" arrived  
on Monday to take up her summer  
sailings from Campbellton to Gaspé,  
and intermediate ports. She carried  
a heavy freight from Quebec to  
points on the North Shore and start-  
ed her regular sailings this week.

The steamer has been refitted and  
re-decorated throughout and will be  
found by travelers to be thoroughly  
up-to-date in every respect.

Before leaving Quebec the Insur-  
ance under-writers made a rigid in-  
spection of the appointments for life  
saving, and thoroughly inspected the  
life boats both as to capacity and  
workability. The inspection was  
thoroughly satisfactory and the boat  
is recorded as being in first class  
shape.

In the voyage from River du Loup  
to Gaspé, the "Canada" was held up  
for considerable time in Gaspé Basin  
owing to fields of ice. It was inter-  
esting to watch the people coming  
off from the shore in their sleighs  
and running along side the ship.

The Canada left on Wednesday  
for Percé and will take up her regu-  
lar sailings on Saturday.
