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BAPTISTS BESIEGE THE CITY.

THOUSANDS ARRIVED BY BOAT AND RAIL LAST NIGHT.

Seven Meetings Will Be Held To-Day - Chief Features of the Opening Conference - Toronto Baptists, Representatives

This is the opening day of the Baptist convention, an event memorable in the denomination's annals as being the first occasion on which delegates from the whole of the United States have assembled on Canadian soil.

Year by year Toronto is becoming the favorite rendezvous for congresses for objects of more or less general interest. This is as it should be, and our visitors are cordially received.

A New Era. The year 1869 marks a new era in Toronto's Baptist history.

Up to this time the policy had been one of centralization and consolidation, with the result that after 40 years the total membership was only 508.

With a growth in the province and a new mission society was formed.

The first fruits of this movement were the churches, organized in Scarborough, Yorkville, in 1871.

The church was built during the pastorate of Rev. Elmore Harris, three years ago.

During this time upwards of 300 have been added to membership, which now numbers 654.

Other churches. Parliament-street Church was organized as a mission of Jarvis-street Church in 1872.

Situated in a thickly settled, artisan neighborhood its work has been largely evangelistic.

Not a few from this church have been pastors and missionaries. Membership 292.

College-street Church had its origin in a mission started by Immanuel Church in 1872.

Rev. S. S. Bates is an indefatigable worker. The present membership is 363.

First-avenue Church was organized in 1874; membership 305.

The Dovercourt-road Church was organized in 1881; membership 171.

Immanuel Church, Parkdale, was organized in 1887; the church numbers 171.

A Great Record. In 1889 Parliament-street Church was organized as a mission of Immanuel Church in 1889.

The result is one of the marvels of Baptist progress. In less than five years a church of 467 members has been gathered; Sunday school records 1,000.

Toronto Junction, 66; Eglinton, 36; and York Mills, 43, are churches in the young and growing districts.

Little York, Birch-avenue and Eastern-avenue missions may be considered as nuclei of future churches.

Verily Toronto is a "City of Churches," for in addition to this record of Baptist progress there is a record of the growth of other denominations.

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THE CASE FEELED OUT.

The Edwards' Apparent Not to Blacken They Had Been Fainted.

Squire Wingfield and Wanless, J.P., heard the evidence for the defence yesterday afternoon in the case of David Edwards and his wife, charged with ill-treating and neglecting the girl Mary Ellen Edwards.

The court held that it had been proven that the girl had been neglected and ill-treated, but the father and mother were allowed to go on suspended sentence, the child to be retained and brought before the judge.

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THE INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION.

Preparations Well Advanced - Privileges and Contracts Let.

Manager Hill of the Industrial Exhibition states that never before in his experience were preparations for the annual show so far advanced in mid-summer as they are now while yet six weeks to the opening.

Inspection of the plans of the various buildings shows that the space is being very quickly taken up. Entries do not close until August 1st, and if the way in which they are now coming in, then early in the afternoon the total will reach the highest number of any previous year.

Several stands which occupied prominent positions in the Manufacturers' Building at the Chicago World's Fair will do duty again in the Main Building. The refreshment privileges are nearly all let. Mr. Harry Webb re-occupies the dining hall at the west end of the grand stand and Mr. Betts the main dining hall. The dining hall at the east end of the stand, formerly occupied by Mr. Hodgway, has been let to Mrs. Meyer.

There will be a number of new electrical features shown. The contracts for general lighting have been let to the Royal Electric Company of Montreal, the Toronto Electric Light Company and the Johnson Electric Company of Toronto.

The Industrial will surpass itself in spectacular display this year. The "Seize of Algiers" will be the spectacle presented, introducing a sea battle with vessels in motion and pyrotechnics on a scale hitherto unattempted.

Judges have been selected in the horse, cattle, sheep, pigs and fruit departments. The program for the trotting and running races has been adopted, some large prizes being offered.
