THE HYAMS CASE

More About Young Wells' Myse Prious Death.

Many Actions Threatened Against the Companies.

Hyams Explains Why He Paid the Pres mium on the Life of Young Wells-What the Detectives Who Investigated the Case Reported-Hyams Claims That

He Has Not Yet Heard of His Wife's

Threatened Action for Alimony. The Hyams insurance case promises to prove more than a nine days' wonders The interest in the affair, instead of subsiding, has been intensified during the

The whole of the circumstances connecte ed with the death of young Wells in Hyams' warehouse have been revived and discussed. There were several matters which gave rise to suspicion at the time of the tragedy: (1) Wells was but 22 years of age, yet his life was insured for \$36,000, of which \$30,000 was in the New York Life, and but one premium had been paid; (2) the premium in the News York Life, which amounted to \$384, was paid by Hyams; (3) at the time of the tragedy Hyams was the only person in tragedy, Hyams was the only person in the warehouse; his brother was at the barber's, his clerk, Mr. Aylesworth, had been sent to transact some business at North Toronto, and the typewriter, a young woman, had not yet arrived at the office, having been given letters to deliver personally on Monday morning, before reporting for duty.

Detectives Davis and Cuddy investigated the matter and reported to the County Attorney. Although the death was considered suspicious, in view of the circumstances, there was not sufficient evidence, in Mr. Curry's opinion, to wars rant an arrest, and none was made.

Before this he had carrried several smaller policies, on which he had paid premiums amounting to \$1200, and then allowed the policies to lapse.

Harry Place Hyams has also an insurance experience. During the past three years he has carrried at different times life insurance on his own life aggregating \$25,000. In each case he paid one or two payments and then allowed the policies to lapse, his last venture being a \$10,000 policy in the Mutual Reserve, on which he gave a note for the first premium. This note will have to be paid although the policy has since lapsed.
