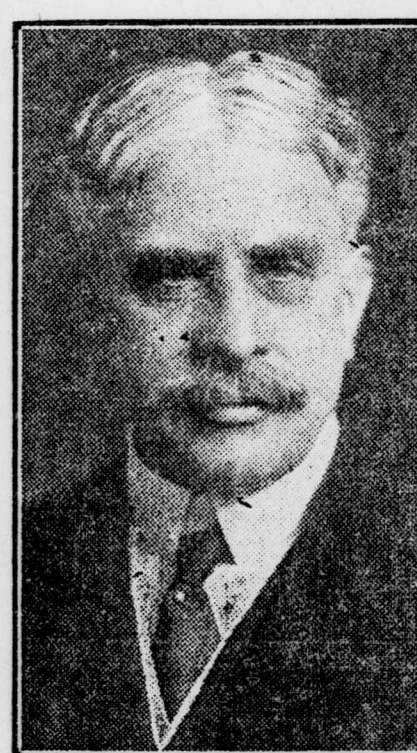

rights and powers of the provinces  
which no treaty, understanding or  
commitment which may involve the  
empire ought to be undertaken ex-  
cept after consultation and by con-  
sent in the common interest. Approval  
of Canada's membership in the  
League of Nations, and the firm  
determination to maintain our  
recognized status as a member of  
this league, the upholding by every  
means within the federal power of  
constitutional authority of the rights  
of the provinces, the maintenance of  
Parliamentary control over all legisla-  
tion, and the preservation of the

INTENTION TO RETIRE**Platform of the New National  
Liberal and Conservative  
Party Is Announced.OTTAWA, July 1.—With the an-  
nouncement of the definite retirement  
of Sir Robert Borden from leadership be-  
cause of the condition of his health, to-  
gether with the consequent necessity of  
naming a new chief, the decision to  
form at once a new permanent party  
caucus of Government followers here to-  
day will go down to posterity as one of  
the most important and significant in  
federal political history. As to the  
name of the party many were suggest-  
ing the name of "The National Party."  
The successful one went to Hon. J.  
A. Calder, minister of immigration and  
colonization, whose choice of "The Na-  
tional Liberal and Conservative Party"  
to be commonly known as "the Na-  
tional party."The retirement of Sir Robert was  
finally accepted only after many appeals  
made to him to remain were met by  
determination on the part of the pre-  
mier to retire.**TO REMAIN IN HOUSE.**  
There was no successor to Sir Robert  
named. Sir Robert has promised to  
retain his seat in the House and to sup-  
port the successor to the best of his  
ability. Among the Cabinet members  
there is also an agreement to stand  
by the man who is ultimately  
named by the whole of the Government  
supporters. Each member of his nom-  
inee in writing to Sir Robert. Some dis-  
tinguished members of the House, like  
Hon. J. A. Calder, Hon. J. G. Mac-  
donald, Hon. J. C. Ballantyne and Hon.  
C. B. Ballantyne are also mentioned.It is also significant that prior to the  
general caucus the Liberal mandate  
held a gathering in camera and decided  
to stand by any man chosen by the  
larger gathering, also to agree to the  
fusion of the Liberal and Conservative  
identities.**DECISION SOON.**  
The resignation of the prime minister  
will be the subject of a meeting of the  
hands of the government-general, and he  
will then recommend to his excellency  
his successor, who will have been de-  
cided upon in the meantime.The constitutional procedure  
which is followed, the retirement of a  
prime minister, carries with it the res-  
ignation of all of his ministers, and  
this does not mean that the Cabinet  
will have to go back for re-election  
that the new premier will need to do  
so. There are several precedents to  
show that the common one of resign-  
ing the present ministers to portfolios  
different from those they held, and then  
reappoint them to the original  
positions.**MR. ROWELL WOULD GO.**Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the  
Privy Council, has already intimated  
that he does not intend that his man-  
date will be extended in the formation of  
a new party.On being urged to reconsider his res-  
ignation, however, Mr. Rowell promised  
to consult with his friends and to com-  
municate his decision to the prime min-  
ister as soon as possible. The sugges-  
tion is made that, should Mr. Rowell re-  
tire, he may go to Washington as the
