ARKONA'S POWER PLANT IN OPERATION.

The enterprising people of the little town of Arkona did not wait for the advent of Niagara power, but availed themselves of the natural advantages within easy reach, and as the result of their efforts electric energy was given a successful test on Saturday last. The power is obtained from Rock Glen, about a mile and a half to the north. A large cement dam was built across the Sauble river, and the tremendous pressure caused by concentrating the outflow through a narrow sluice to the turbine wheels furnishes the power which is transmitted by wire to the town.

The credit for conceiving and successfully carrying out this enterprise is largely due to Mr. T. W. Mitchell and Fuller Bros., who had the courage of their convictions, financed the undertaking and supervised its construction.

Electric lights have already been installed in many of the business places, and the street lights will shortly be placed in position. It is expected that the flouring mill will be run by the power in a few days, and the saving in fuel alone means not a little.

Arkona is to be congratulated on having a plant that is surpassed by few in the country, one that means much for the future prosperity of the place.

Drop in Hogs.

Toronto, Nov. 29.—The World says: J. W. Flavelle, of the Wm. Davies Co., upon being interviewed as to the hog situation in Ontario, said that he could not enlighten the farmers as to the future. He was as much in the dark as they were.

The dramatic drop in the United States market to below the \$4 mark has produced a corresponding uneasiness in Canada. But the return to the \$4.35 in that market was more reassuring.

"The market in the old country and on this continent is also demoralized," said the representative of the Wm. Davies Co., "and we do not know what to prepare for here. We are, therefore, just sitting on the situation until some permanency to the market appears."

It is to be lamented that so many nice young heifers and young sows are being marketed by the farmers. It seems almost cruelly to send these to the shambles. The farmers will have to repurchase their breeding stock next year, and it seems poor policy to hurry them off in the present scare.

That feed will be much cheaper in the spring seems to be current opinion, and the farmers who have to purchase feed would likely do well to delay such until absolutely necessary to do so.

At any rate there is no need for a departure from a business that has paid the farmers so well in the past, and gives promise of doing as well in the future. We are a hog-raising people, and second thoughts are wise.
