Easter Vestries.

TRINITY CHURCH, WATFORD.
There was a good attendance at the vestry meeting in Trinity church on Easter Monday evening. The rector, Rev. S. P. Irwin, presided. The Warden presented the financial report for the year, which shows a credit balance in the neighborhood of \$100. The report was adopted and passed to the auditors. The election of officers resulted as follows:—
Rector's warden—A. G. Brown.
People's warden—W. A. Wykesmith.
Sidesmen—C. A. Class, P. J. Dodds, E. A. Brown, W. H. Shrapnell.
Auditors—P. Kenward and P. J. Dodds.
Meeting adjourned for one week to receive auditors' report, after which the statistical and auditors' reports will be printed and given out.
The rector thanked the retiring wardens for their faithful work during their term of office.
At the congregational meeting following, James Newell, M.D., was elected delegate to the Diocesan Synod, with John Shirley alternate.

ST. JAMES' CHURCH, BROOKE.
The Easter vestry meeting was held on Monday morning, the rector presiding. The financial statement handed in by the wardens was a very satisfactory one, showing a comfortable credit balance, the total receipts being \$663.50, which includes \$162.00 for missions. Rev. S. P. Irwin appointed R. J. Lucas as his warden, and B. A. Richardson was elected people's warden. Sidesmen, Alex. Kelly, Albt. Sutton, Elmer Moffatt, C. McLellan, Thos. Woods. Vestry clerk, Albert Sutton.

At the meeting of the congregation B. A. Richardson was selected to represent the church at the synod, with Dan. Kelly as substitute.

CHRIST CHURCH, SUTHERVILLE.
The annual vestry meeting was held Tuesday evening. The Warden's report is by far the best in the history of this young congregation, showing receipts of \$423.04, leaving a balance on the right side of the ledger. The rector, Rev. S. P. ST. MARY'S CHURCH, WARWICK.




