

DEATH OF THOMAS LEACOCK

Former Business Man of Watford Passes at Brigden.

(Brigden Progress)
On Tuesday, March 25, another of the pioneer settlers of Canada passed peacefully away in the person of Mr. Thomas Leacock. Although in failing health for a number of years, loving care from dearones kept the spark of life aflame until a few weeks ago, when bronchitis developed which terminated fatally. The funeral took place March 27th, to Bear Creek cemetery and was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Keyes, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Richardson, of the Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Leacock was born in Glasgow, Scotland, on January 27th, 1835. He was

Scotland, on January 27th, 1835. He was the eldest of eleven children of the late John and Mrs. Leacock, of Brooke Town-ship. When a child of two years his ship. When a child of two years his parents came from Ireland, where they had been residing, to America and settled in Toronto, later going to Pittsburg, Penn., where for nine years they made their home. Returning to Canada they lived in London and Union, later coming west to the bush farm lot 15, Brooke. Finding the work of chopping and clearing the farm too irksome, he sought the trade of blacksmithing and worked for some years in Warwick Village near Watford.

He built the first blacksmith shop in the latter place and the building stood until a few years ago when it was taken down to be replaced by the new Merchants Bank building.

In 1864 he married Miss Eliza Rooney, who survives him. Thirty-eight years ago he moved with his family to Brigden where he built a shop and worked at his trade until failing health compelled him to give up and the business was taken over by his son. Mr. Leacock was a kind father and loving husband and for a number of years was a member of the Methodist church.

Those who loved him best knew that he served his Master and was happy. Besides his sorrowing wife he is survived by eight children, three sons and five daughters, Will, Hamilton, Herb., Sask.; Ham, Brigden; Amelia and Flossie, Toortet.
