The produce market is dull, with few transactions taking place-Large quantities of wheat have been offering on Change during the past week, but buyers could not be found except at lower figures than were before ruling.

This is to be accounted for by the very large receipts both by rail and teams, which have come to hand within the past few weeks, since the good sleighing set in. The proposal made to increase the American import duty has also tended to make wheat buyers cautious. Several of our merchants who have been pur chasing on United States account have had their orders withdrawn since the change in the United States tariff was proposed, and they are now offering what they hold for sale on our market. This, with the causes above mentioned, has produced an unusual dulness in

Prices are still very high here, in proportion to other shipping points. Farmers would do well to take advantage of this while they can, and at once send forward their grain to market. If the proposed American import duties are put in force, a decline in prices must be expected.

Flour.—Market steady; No. 1 superfine held at from \$6 65 to \$6 75, with sales of round lots at the latter price; extra and superior nominal.

Wheat.—Market dull; spring wheat held at from \$137 to \$142; with sales at from \$136 to \$141. Fall wheat nominal. No lots changing hands, and very little coming in by teams.

Oats unchanged at from 30c to 32c.

Barley.-No receipts; a car choice sold at 55c; very little offering on the street.

Pear.—No round lots changed hands; as high as 69c was paid for a few loads on the street market.
