From what even the Indians have accomplished in agriculture, the country seems to hold out great hopes to the farmer. The Indians there are mostly supported by agriculture, and according to returns before me, four tribes of Christian Indians on the northern and southern banks of the Kansas cultivate four thousand acres. From these they raised, in a late year, \$0,000 bushels of corn, 2,690 bushels of wheat, and 12,000 bushels of oats, 4,000 hogs and 200,000 melons of different kinds. They kept 660 working oxen, and a large number of horses. The annual value of their products is put down at \$31,000. The number of these indians is placed at 1702.
