These are not the unreal shadows of a dream, they are fully warranted and indicated by the march of events, and it is to be hoped that the day will come when our character as a nation will stand by the side of hers who quickened it into life, and not pale by the comparison, when the noblest aspirations of men now living shall be realized, and our present conceptions be manifested by the solicity which government derives from unity, and the force which it exemplifies by character.
