FREIGHT RATES

STUDY OF LESS THAN CARLOAD RATES IN ATLANTIC PROVINCES

On the orders of the day:

Mr. Robert McCleave (Halifax-East Hants): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Transport. I gave him notice of it yesterday. Can the hon. gentleman advise as to the progress in the studies of the Canadian Transportation Commission dealing with less than carload rates for Atlantic Canada, and when we may expect action on such studies in parliament?

Hon. Paul Hellyer (Minister of Transport): We have been doing some internal studies on this question, Mr. Speaker, but in addition, as my hon. friend will recall, last year I asked the Atlantic premiers to put their heads together and come up with some recommendations which they felt would be useful to the Atlantic region. The reason I suggested this is that the criticism is often made that Ottawa is remote from the problems of the area, and the people living there are more intimately aware of the problems and as a result might suggest more effective solutions.

Up to this point I have not received any report from the Atlantic premiers. I hope this will be forthcoming soon, so that whatever input they have can be considered with our own studies in the very real hope that we can

get some policy which will be both reasonably economical in broad terms and more effective to maritime transportation.

Mr. McCleave: As a supplementary question, do I understand from the minister's answer that the Canadian Transportation Commission has completed its side of the studies?

Mr. Hellyer: I did not say completed, Mr. Speaker, but I understand that an internal paper has been forwarded for consideration by our department. Just how extensive it is I cannot say, because I have not yet seen it.

Mr. Robert C. Coates (Cumberland-Colchester North): As a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker, could the minister indicate whether it is the intention of the government to continue the rate freeze until such time as a transportation policy is produced for the Atlantic provinces?

Mr. Hellyer: I do not think this would be a good morning for speculation on that point, Mr. Speaker. I would really prefer to give the government a chance to look at the over-all problem and decide what is the best solution compared with some others that might be offered.
