ADDITIONAL PASSPORT ISSUING SERVICE

Mr. R. Gordon L. Fairweather (Fundy-Royal): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Secretary of State for External Affairs. Can the minister advise the house of any plans for solving the problems in the passport office occasioned by the resignation of five staff members due to unsatisfactory working conditions?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, I had a report I could have given the house but I was not satisfied that it answered all of the questions that were in the minds of hon. members. I am sure that one of the reasons for the resignation of some of these members of the staff of the passport office is the great burden of overtime work they have all had to bear. We have increased the staff of the passport office by many, many scores. Notwithstanding that, 7,500 hours of overtime have been worked. We are asking the staff to work Saturdays on a regular basis. I hope the members of the house will realize what a tremendous job the passport office is doing, notwithstanding the fact that some passports have not been issued as quickly as they would have liked.

Mr. Fairweather: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Would it not be possible to augment the government's very sensible plan to open regional offices, as announced some months ago?

Mr. Sharp: Mr. Speaker, if it were as easy as that we should have done it yesterday. The trouble is that we have to have trained personnel. The purpose of the passport office in part is to see that unauthorized persons do not obtain passports. I do not think we ought to reduce security provisions in order to increase volume.

Mr. David Orlikow (Winnipeg North): A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Has the government considered increasing the staff of its office in Ottawa so that applications may be processed more quickly. Also, will that staff be payed at a higher than usual rate for any overtime it puts in?

Mr. Sharp: Mr. Speaker, the staff has already been augmented by 90 persons in recent weeks. We brought them in to deal with the overload. One of our problems of course is lack of space. Perhaps I should not

Mr. Pelletier: I have in fact received representations and I intend to reply when I am better able to foresee how long it will be before approval is given to the election procedure needed to establish the permanent council.
