to know that that individual was associated with the Prime Minister's Office. Why this underhanded approach to what was going on?

Mr. Nickerson: It is an underhanded government.

Miss MacDonald: Where are the explanations? That is at the heart of this question of privilege. As long as that sort of operation is able to continue, there is absolutely no guarantee for any Member of Parliament in this House who opposes the Government, or for any individual citizen across the land who is critical of the operations of this Government, that his or her rights and his other personal lives will not be investigated and will not be exposed for nefarious reasons by this Government. It is so bankrupt, Sir, that it will stoop to anything to try to hold on. Every day it digs its grave deeper.

Mr. Speaker: The Chair would like to state that it has heard fairly extensive argument at this point. The matter of privilege is a narrow one that has to be decided by the Chair. The Chair would like to proceed to other business of the House.

## PRAIRIE GRAIN ADVANCE PAYMENTS ACT

MEASURE TO AMEND

Mr. Gordon Taylor (Bow River) moved for leave to introduce Bill C-218, an Act to amend the Prairie Grain Advance Payments Act (spouses).

Some Hon. Members: Explain.

Mr. Taylor: Mr. Speaker, Section 7(3.2) of this Act discriminates against a productive farm woman who is legally married to a productive farm man. A farm woman who owns land and who has a permit book from the Canadian Wheat Board may, if she is single or living common law, receive prairie grain advance payments provided she has the grain in her bins to cover same. A farm woman in exactly the same category but who is married to a farmer who also has a permit book from the Canadian Wheat Board is denied advance

payments. In all cases the bill is paid when the grain is taken to an elevator. This Bill will remove this discrimination against married women in this group. Our legislation should not encourage common law arrangements by granting benefits to a common law spouse which is denied to a legally married spouse when all other factors are the same.
