Motions

this Government is trying to create jobs in the Canadian economy essentially in two ways—through tax changes which encourage the private sector to create jobs, and through direct action. There is direct action in government programs, both through the Special Recovery Projects and also direct programs in my Department aimed at creating jobs.

I wish very much that at the moment we could provide a job for every single Canadian who wishes to have one. We have succeeded in those programs, not as far as we would like, but we have succeeded with them. We pointed out to the Hon. Member, I think last week, that something like 320,000 seasonally adjusted new jobs have been created in the Canadian economy, largely, I believe, because of the kinds of programs we have adopted.

If the hon, gentleman, who stood up and with emotion and sincerity indicated the plight that unemployment is causing in his constituency, could suggest specific things to me which we are not doing, that we could do that will have an impact, I will be delighted to hear him.

- 1. No. However, in March of 1983, Petro-Canada Products Ltd. commissioned a series of advertisements designed to inform the public of the BP reidentification program. (a) \$377,213.17
