I have duly received your letter of the 11th inst., regarding the appointment of an Indian member of the Senate.

I have no doubt that there must be amongst our Canadian Indians many men whose attainments and position would fit them to take part in the deliberations of our Senior Legislative body, and who would be very worthy members of our Parliament.

It seems a little difficult to say what definite arrangements, excepting some sort of general convention, could be made in view of the fact that the Senate consists of representatives of districts. I do feel, however, that your representations ought to be and will be carefully considered by the Federal Cabinet.
