vention to consider the same and have it referred to the Dominion board to deal with.

Three other important resolutions were passed by the convention yesterday and are as follows:

"We hereby request the executive officers to call the attention of the Ontario Government to the fact that there is not sufficient time given between the time a bill is introduced and the time that it receives its third reading, and this does not give the merchants sufficient time to consider the same."

Store Thefts.

"That whereas petty thefts are constantly taking place in departmental stores, and the number of them are greatly out of proportion to the thefts that take place in other stores, and whereas the cost of administration of the law through our criminal courts is gradually increasing by reason of these thefts, we therefore request the executive to call the attention of the board of police commissioners to this fact and ask them if they would suggest a remedy."

"That it be an instruction from this convention, to the incoming executive, that whenever they deem it desirable that they make such arrangements as will keep them posted as to the class of articles that appear in newspapers, magazines and journals which reflect on the character and ability of retail merchants, and that they take such steps as will prevent the same."

This is to take the place of a withdrawal of the advertisements of retail merchants from the offending periodicals.

The convention concludes with today's session.

DEMOCRATS STAND IN SOLID PHALANX

Republican Minority Struggle Futile to Check Tariff Bill's Progress.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(Can. Press).—Excited debate and heated wrangle today marked the beginning of the reading of the tariff bill in the house for amendment. Pro-

gress on the perfection of the measure was slow, but the talk was loud and vociferous, and on one occasion brought speaker Clark to the floor with a vigorous speech.

All day the Republicans offered amendments to various paragraphs in the chemical schedule, and every amendment was calmly voted down by the big Democratic majority.

Much of the talk of the day turned on the record of the Democratic and Republican side of the house on the question of creating a tariff commission. The Republicans, led by Representative Mann of Illinois, began their attacks on the provisions of the first schedule of the bill, the chemical schedule, by declaring that the "weaknesses" in the rate showed the need of the investigation of a tariff board.

Representative Underwood, in reply, declared that the Democrats had provided the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce in the department of commerce, and that the failure of the Taft administration to vitalize the bureau with sufficient appropriations had prevented its doing the work of tariff investigation.

Reading of the chemical schedule was completed shortly after 6 o'clock and the house recessed.

METHODIST PLANS ON MORAL REFORM

Appointment of New Associate Secretary—Dominion Divided Into Districts.

Rev. Dr. T. Albert Moore, Methodist moral reform secretary, will take a trip in June to study social conditions in Norway, so that he will be in a position to speak authoritatively on the merits of government ownership of the liquor traffic.

Owing to the decision of Rev. John Garbutt to decline the position of additional associate secretary in the department of moral reform, Rev. T. Jackson Wray has been appointed. He will have charge of the western work, and be located in Winnipeg.

Rev. Dr. Haskwood has decided to make Toronto his headquarters for the central Canada moral reform district.

Rev. J. Smith will have headquarters at Montreal for the eastern provinces. For the present, the efforts of the department will be concentrated on rescue and educational work, and the establishment of homes for victims of the white slave traffic.
