Importance of Good Food

To economize on baby's food is the greatest extravagance. Rather buy the greatest extravagance. Rather buy plain clothing, a cheap crib and a cheap baby carriage and spare no ex-pense to set the best milk and to get it fresh. If you live in the city, get certified milk, or that from the labor-atories which make a specialty of milk for infants and invalids. This milk needs neither sterilization nor pasteur-ization, unless the child has bowel trouble, in which case milk should be sterilized or pasteurized to render it less liable to fermentation. It may be given as an absolute rule that the salad determines the character of the dressing, says a writer for The Ladies' Home Journal.

Home Journal. Substantial salads that are to serve as the main dish at luncheon or supper are made of eggs, fish, meat. combina-tions of dried or fresh vegetables, fruit or nuts, and the dressing to be used with them must be of a heavy character. For this reason mayonnaise, boiled or cream dressing is used when the salad is to constitute the principal course. In no case is a boiled dressing ever termed a mayonnaise.
