

FOREIGN BUYING OF WHEAT LESS

Slackening of Export Demand Caused Weak Finish at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Feb. 26.—Although wheat prices today felt the effects of the crop deficit in Argentina, Australia and India, export demand failed to come up to what was looked for. Accordingly, the market had a weak finish at 3/4 to 3/8 net advance.

It developed that yesterday's export sales of wheat were larger than had been generally supposed, and it was hoped that the foreign call would continue liberal.

Extremely favorable weather in the winter crop region as a whole had considerable to do with moderating bullish sentiment regarding wheat, notwithstanding that conditions so early in the season were acknowledged to make an ample guide.

Receipts of farm produce were 100 bushels of grain, 15 loads of hay, and 1 load of straw.

SYNOPSIS OF DOMINION LAND REGULATIONS. ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District in which the land is to be homesteaded. Entry by proxy may be made by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties: Six months' residence upon the land, or at least 90 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, in certain Districts a homestead of 800 acres may be pre-empted a quarter-section of available Dominion Land, 33.33 per cent. must reside upon the homestead or pre-empted land in each of six years from date of homestead claim (including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra).

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead of not less than 40 acres, 40.99 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
