#### HORSEMEN CONCEDE PLATE TO GIDDINGS

Only a Fifth of Original Entries Will Face Starter in Today's Feature.

The opening of the Canadian racing season commences at beautiful Woodbine Park today, and the fifty-fifth annual King's plate, the most important turf event for province breds, and the most prized tropay among Canadian horsemen. There were 32 nominations for this event, but more than one-fifth of the number will face the barrier. There have been many trials quate satisfactory. Yet it is almost unanimously conceded that the King's guineas will again go to Giddings. Bee Hive, by Baszetlaw—My Honey, has shown the fastest trial, with the Seagram entry and Gold Bud, the Davis entry, in close attendance. Bee Hive did not meet defeat in his two-year-old form, and it looks decidedly his way for the plate for 1914.


