

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Fanitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by prexy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.
