constructed of that form which best answers the purposes for which they seem intended. The knowledge of the optician and anatomist, scanty as it is, is yet fufficient to convince him that the eye is of that form which best answers the pur- " pofes of vision; he perceives in fome degree the propriety and neceffity of every muscle, coat, and humour which composes that delightful organ; he is convinced there is nothing defective. nothing redundant. The moralist who reflects on the mental world, makes the fame observation on the inftincts and paffions of animals ; he will not therefore readily acquiefce with Dr. Price, that man, the fovereign of the earth, is the only animal of imperfect construction, which he certainly is, if the form of government which the Doctor has given a fketch of be abfolutely neceffary to his welfare; fince it neither now is, nor ever was, established to any extensive degree ; and therefore this defect must arise from the natural imperfection of man.

It falls not within the purpole of this difquifition to attempt to defcribe the most excellent forms of government; but on this occasion it may not be improper to declare that the principal purpoles of government of every state are the
