FOTATO PRICES ARE UP Market Depends Usually on U.S. Product, as Canada's Grop is Late.

The problem of the price of potatoes has been agitating the householder for some time, and present indications hold forth little prospect of any decrease in price for two or three weeks yet. Not until the late potatoes come in will there be any appreciable de-

cline in the price. The early Canadian potatoes have

The early Canadian potatoes have not yet begun to come in in large enough quantities for the wholesalers to bother with, and as a result U. S. potatoes have been largely used.

The dealers much prefer handling the U. S. potatoes, because they are grown in straight varieties and not having been subject to any extremes of weather, are of very large size. The average Canadian potato producer does not grow one variety, and it is at very few loading stations in Ontario, at least, where a full carload of a straight variety can be loaded.

Thomas H. Cleghorn, one of the foremost wholesalers in the city, declared
last night that there are any amount of
Canadian potatoes, but they haven't
matured yet, and as a result they will
be small. There has been quite a little
blight, too. In his spinion potatoes will
drop as low as 75 cents a bag by fall.
