WAR SUMMARY

THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

In the heavy fighting in the Champagne yesterday, the French held up the enemy advance on their right and left wings, but they were unable to prevent him from advancing in the centre and occupying Perre-en-Tardent.

Details of the fighting when closely examined show that the position of the French is not so bad as it looks on the surface, for they have succeeded in holding their flanks firm, preventing any further spreading westward on the outskirts of Soissons.

In this stupendous action, on which the fate of empires depends, the enemy has shown more method than in previous stupendous actions, for he first attempted to widen the neck of the salient and gained two miles laterally in the occupation of Soissons, and also a mile, perhaps, laterally in his attempt to widen the neck of the salient.

Having got off with a fair start, the Germans are dropping everything else in a determination to exploit their initial advantage in the Champagne. In the first two or three days

HEART MURMURS OFTEN NO BAR

Speaker at Medical Congress Says Many Men Are Fit for Service.

Hamilton, May 30.—That under the improved methods and standardization a large proportion of men suffering from heart murmurs and now not fit for active service would be rendered wholly or partially fit was the assertion of Dr. Lewellyn F. Barker of Baltimore, Md. He spoke "On the significance of heart murmurs found in examination of candidates for military service" at this afternoon's session of the medical congress in the Royal Connaught Hotel.

STRUCK BY MOTOR CAR.

General Foch had to beware of feints, and so had to wait until the enemy had fully shown his intentions. The dangerous portion of the battlefield is the western flank, for the enemy is showing his design of attempting to secure an advantageous line in the south so as to enable him to wheel westward and to widen the gap torn in the front line system of defences.

In a battle of this sort the essential factor is speed and time. The next twelve or twenty-four hours are likely to be the most critical, for they will determine whether the conflagration definite limits. The enemy has obtained a good start, but the French have excellent facilities for rapid concentration. Their reserves appear to have massed near Amiens, but they certainly left an adequate force to protect their capital. The accession of Von Mackensen to the German higher command is probably responsible for the improved working of the enemy war machine.

The German design as thus disclosed by his dash for the Marne reveals a plan which if successful would appear to decide the war at one stroke. The forcing of the allies to retreat from the country west of Soissons under threat of an envelopment would result in tremendous destruction of war material and cripple their efforts for a year. Fortunately the enemy is apparently magnifying his own resources and the allies have seen thru his manoeuvre from the beginning. Thus they will have time to protect themselves and to defeat the enemy designs. If but even in this grandiose effort, which resembles in conception a time novel plot, the enemy may be brought to good, he will ever be dangerous.

On the British front the Canadians have had an important raid at Neuville-Vitasse. These men now had a line apparently from Lens and Souchy to the Scarpe and also a company in the Dikchebusch Lake region. The French carried out a local operation, the results of which are not yet known. The considerable betterment of the British line in order to achieve something splendid against the French, the operations in Flanders and Picardy have become of lesser importance.
