TO DRIVE BACK TROOPS MENACING PETROGRAD

Copenhagen, Aug. 10.—A despatch from Petrograd, dated Friday, reports that the Bolshevik government has decided to adopt the proposal of Zinoviev, the Bolshevik governor of Petrograd, to drive back the troops of General Judenich, commander-in-chief of the forces operating against Petrograd from the south, to the Estonian frontier.

The Bolshevik ministers have also decided to carry on in Estonia Bolshevik propaganda, which they consider their most effective weapon.

It closed firm with car lots. No. 2 Canadian western, quoted at 110.2; No. 3 C.W., at 95.5; extra No. 1 feed at 11¢ per bushel, extra No. 2 feed at 10¢ per bushel. The market for the week was active and the undertone to the market firm. The market for mill feed is exceedingly strong and prices are advanced 3¢ and shorts 2¢ to 3¢ a ton. However, still quote car lots of bran and shorts at no accident, respectively. The market for rolled oats is weaker and prices have declined.
