

Report Adopted.

At yesterday's meeting of the Council of the College of Pharmacy there was a discussion regarding the bill passed at the last session of the Legislature, which prohibits the sale of alcohol and l'quors by a druggist without a doctor's certificate. There was almost a universal opinion that the Government had not done right in placing alcohol on the same basis as whisker. It was pointed out that frequently druggists were called upon by artists and arichitects for alcohol to use with their coloring materials, and that it seemed foolish that they should have to go to a physician for a certificate.

A committee was appointed to interview the Government and endeavor to have the law fixed so that druggists could sell alcohol without a doctor's certificate.

The Educational Committee reported the equipment of the college to be in first-class condition. The committee also advised that no examination in practical chemistry be held in September. A list of examiners was presented with a revised scale of remuneration, which showed a slight increase. The report was adopted.
