JUNCTION CATTLE MARKET. LARGE EXPORT RECEIPTS.

Seventy Thousand Dollars Paid to Supply the Beef Eaters of Great Britain.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards were 56 car loads, consisting of 1068 cattle, 20 sheep, 11 hogs and 2 calves.

Trade was brisk, all offerings being sold and weighed up before 12 o'clock noon. Prices were good all round, but when the quality of the cattle is considered the advance in prices was no more than might be expected.

The bulk of the offerings, in fact nearly all were of the export class, and the banks at the market report having cashed cheques amounting to \$70,000.

Butchers—Best lots of choice butcher cattle, equal in quality to best exporters, heifers and steers, 1050 to 1150 lbs. each, sold at \$4.25 to \$4.75 per cwt.

Calves—W. B. Leback bought the calves at \$3 each, and the sheep at \$1 per cwt. William Leback bought the largest number, having secured 20 car loads, for which he paid from \$4.70 to \$5.20 per cwt.
