"Just a bit sea-scarred." said Capt Day yesterday. "It was a tough sail, I tell you; but then, look at the Rhoda! Isn't she just as tough as any gale that ever swept the Atlantic? Davy Jones' locker? Why, we never thought of it, though we did ship some bloomin' good seas. I guess the milk in the cocoanuts is shook up a little, but here we are, fine and dandy."

The Rhoda, which registers only 196 tons, left San Bias, Sept. 22. From the time the dim lines of the isthmus were lost to view, the craft ran into a succession of gales that drove her out of her course until Oct. 14. Those days were hard enough, according to the captain, but, after having regained his course, another hurricane struck the schooner on Oct. 19.

"That wind was the worst I have experlenced in my forty years' care on the seas of the world," said Capt. Day. "Every mother's son of us was lashed to his post. When that gale had blown itself out, we were a tired lot of sailors.'

The schooner's dog mascot Scotia was washed overboard by one great wave and was thrown on board again by another. A third great wave swept the decks, and this time Scotia did not reappear. When the winds calmed Capt. Day

beat his way up the coast. The captain reported to the owners that the schooner Carthagena, reported as lost, had put in at Southport, dead and thirteen suffering from coast
