LIFELONG READER: Q.came home on pass for three days on October 12, and was taken sick with Spanish influenza the night i arrived home. Am I entitled to subsistence allowance and doctor's

A.—Cases similar to yours are dealt with separately upon their respective merits. If there was a military doctor in the vicinity of your home you could have called to attend you you would not be granted your civilian doctor's fee. Moreover, if there was a military hospital near your home which you could have entered for treatment you have no claim for subsistence.
