HINDENBURG BLAMES LACK OF UNITY FOR GERMANY'S FAILURE

BERLIN, Nov. 18.—Field Marshal von Hindenburg declared before the subcommittee of the National Assembly investigating the war responsibility:

"I know with absolute certainty that neither the people, the Kaiser nor the Government desired war, for the Government knew better than others that Germany's tremendously difficult position in a war against the entente."

Germany's defensive strength, said the field marshal, was as unfavorable as possible from the start. It might be left to history to decide why Germany's peace policy had failed.

"If the military authorities prepared for the possibility of an unavoidable war," continued von Hindenburg, "that was only their duty towards the nation. If there had been solid, united co-operation between army and home front, we could have attained victory."

"While with the enemy, notwithstanding his superiority in all respects, we were united ever more firmly in the determination to be victorious. With us, although we were immediately inferior, interests at home made their influence felt, and this state of affairs led to the breaking off of the will to victory."

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PARIS PAPERS HAIL ELECTION RESULT AS TRIUMPH OF ORDER

Socialist Papers Alone Are 'Sullen and Bitter.'

BOLSHEVISM CRUSHED

Most Determined Enemies of Peace Ratification Were Defeated.

PARIS, Nov. 18.—All the newspapers hail the result of the elections as a triumph of law and order over Bolshevism, excepting the Socialist papers, which adopt a sullen and bitter tone.

Henry Franklin-Bouillon, Jean Louguet, Charles Chaumet and Pierre Renaudel, the most determined enemies of M. Clemenceau and ratification of the peace treaty, were defeated.

(L'Homme Libre, commenting on the elections, says: "An admirable, glorious day for law and order.")

The L'Espresso says: "Bolshevism is crushed." L'Action Française says: "It is a great day for the vitality of the French Republic."

Barthelemy, former premier, was also elected. The Marquis de Chambrun, the Catholic sent two priests to the Chamber to pray for the victory of the Republic. They were M. de la Motte and M. de la Roche.

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U. S. GOVERNMENT DECIDES TO COMPEL WORKING OF MINES

Action of Federal Authorities Now Imperative.

CONFERENCE TODAY

Fuel Administrator Will Submit Ultimatum To Both Sides.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The Government stepped to the front today to force miners and operators to negotiate a new wage agreement and resume work in the bituminous fields before the country should be caught in the grip of a coal famine.

Clothed with all of his war-time powers as fuel administrator, and acting by direct authority of the president, the Government today issued a proclamation calling a joint meeting of scale committees, at which he was expected to give formal notice that the time had come to resume mining operations on a normal scale.

While the conference was set for this afternoon, Dr. Garfield found that a full attendance could not be obtained, so it went over until tomorrow. Meanwhile word was passed that the strike situation had reached the point where action was regarded by federal authorities as absolutely imperative.

No Headway.

There was no evidence, as presented to the cabinet, that the scale committees called here last week to negotiate a new wage agreement had made the least headway. Reports from the central committee fields, embracing the states of Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania, the stronghold of the United Mine Workers of America, all mines shut down and no work done, coming from non-union plants in other states to meet the normal demand by several million tons.

Other reports from widely separated sections brought the same story of a rapidly vanishing supply, with indications that hundreds of industrial plants would be forced to close shortly unless coal production was put back at normal. In the view of many officials the situation was critical enough to demand drastic action.

Refuses Statement.

Although he would not discuss the nature of his statement, the president, it was said on high authority, refused to say whether he intended to force the situation forcibly to the chief executives of the mine owners and the mine workers. There was no indication as to what direction governmental action would take in case the deadlock continued.

Steps taken by Kansas to operate the mines under government authority, would do likewise, were urged as a strong reason for quick settlement of all wage disputes.

NEW LIQUIDATION MOVEMENT IN WALL STREET CAUSES DROP

Reactions at Times as Drastic as Last Week.

SENSATIONAL DECLINES

High Money Rate Again Creates Panic in New York Trading.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Wall Street, as represented by the stock exchange, engaged in further house-cleaning today. The reaction at times was no less drastic than that which attended last week's sensational liquidation movement.

The decline today derived much of its momentum from the maintenance of high money rates, the complete collapse of foreign exchange and indications that the safety of the financial situation demanded further readjustment of speculative conditions.

In the course of the reversal many stocks went considerably below recent minimums, and bonds, and rails, which gave promise of laying a sound foundation for future operations, eased at the first signs of pressure.

Local brokers were less active in the selling than the commission houses. This confined the impression prevalent in many quarters that the accounts of many out-of-town traders with reduced margins were being liquidated.

Unsettled centered in Crucible Steel, one of the famous "war brides," and later popular as a "peace" industrial. Crucible not so long ago sold up to \$24 a share, more than three and one-half times its high price in 1918, and almost two and one-half times higher than its maximum in the boom of 1915.

Recently new interests have come into control of the property, and the stock has been subjected to considerable bear pressure. Its extreme decline today was 2 1/2 points to 17 1/2.

Other steels of the general "industrial group" reacted 5 to 10 points with kindred equipments, motors, oils and lubricants, the movement as a whole being strongly suggestive of similar professional cliques.

WINNIPEG JURY FINDS TRUE BILL AGAINST THE STRIKE LEADERS

WINNIPEG, Nov. 18.—The grand jury, sitting at the courthouse this afternoon, returned a true bill against the eight strike leaders charged with sedition and conspiracy. In addition to returning a true bill, the grand jury declared in their report that the men were a public nuisance. They will come for trial toward the end of the week.

The accused are: R. B. Russell, Rev. William George Johns, George Armstrong, Ald. A. A. Heape, Ald. John Queen, William Pritchard and R. E. E. Gallagher.

A fund of \$50,000 has been raised by labor men to defend the strike leaders.

Steamer Reported Lost in Big Storm Docks at Toledo

TOLEDO, Ohio, Nov. 18.—The freighter Griffin, which cleared from Ashland, Wis., on November 10, with a cargo of ore for Toledo, and which was reported lost in a storm on the lakes on Sunday, docked here today.

The storm, which is believed to have sunk the steamer John Owen of Cleveland, with a crew of 22 men, struck the Griffin 100 miles east of Ashland.

Captain J. H. Gallagher probably saved the Griffin by turning back and heading for Apostle Islands, where he anchored for two days during the storm.

Rumanian Queen After the Consolidation of Austria and Rumania

VIENNA, Nov. 18.—A dispatch from Rumania is printed with reservations by a local newspaper to the effect that Queen Marie recently visited former Emperor Charles of Austria at his residence in Switzerland, and asked him to renounce all claims to the Hungarian throne in order to facilitate the consolidation of the two countries under the Rumanian crown.

The queen is said to have offered Charles a large sum of money in return.

Majority of Aliens Interned in Canada Already Deported

OTTAWA, Nov. 18.—The deportation, or as it is euphemistically termed by the authorities, the "repatriation," of enemy aliens held prisoner of war in Canadian camps during the past few years, is now almost complete. More than two thousand Germans and Austrians have already been sent home via Holland and other neutral countries.

About 250 men still remain to be sent to their fatherlands. These are for the most part at Kapuskasing. Most of them will take away a comfortable sum, since they were entitled to 25 cents a day while employed in the camps. They will leave behind several well cleared and highly cultivated acres of land in New Ontario and elsewhere, which will be used for experimental farm purposes, and as a nucleus for further settlement in these regions.
