### BAD FIRE AT GLENCOE.

Number of Business Places Destroyed in Early Morning.

GLENCOE, Ont., Aug. 25.—This village experienced this morning the worst fire which has occurred here in many years. At 3.30 a.m. there was seen rising from a building owned by George Parrott, and occupied by Dan Hurly, machine agent, and J. Buchanan, tailor, near the corner of Main and McKellar streets. These buildings, together with a number of others on either side, are frame, and constitute part of the oldest business portions of the town. The adjoining buildings were occupied by A. E. Archer, jeweler; H. Moore, barber; D. Lamont, harness-maker; J. A. McLaughlin, confectioner; and N. J. Sessmith, boots and shoes, and all were destroyed, together with the greater portion of the different stocks. The fire lasted an hour only. The principal losses are: J. A. McLaughlin, building \$2500, furniture \$1500, stock \$2000; insurance \$4000. E. Archer, stock \$8000; insurance \$1100. Geo. Parrott, building \$2000; insurance \$1400. J. Buchanan, \$200; no insurance. D. Hurly, \$1000; no insurance. D. Lamont, stock \$2000; insurance \$1100. Miss M. Smith, buildings \$1500; no insurance. E. Moore, \$200; no insurance. J. N. Sessmith, loss about \$400.

### OFFICERS MAKE BIG HAUL UP THE HUMBER

Recover a Lot of Stolen Goods—Death of North Toronto Resident—County News.

HUMBER BAY, Aug. 25.—(Special.)—County Constable George Simpson, the well-known officer who keeps a constant watch over the Humber Bay and Mimico district, and who for the past two weeks has been keeping an especially sharp lookout up the Humber River, was amply rewarded for his diligence. About two weeks ago a large quantity of goods, amounting in value to \$150, were stolen from Mrs. Cornish, and to the value of about \$20 from Mrs. A. B. Rea. Constable Simpson found the stuff hidden away, and which was all identified today by the owners. The officer was accompanied by Mr. Tavenor, George May and George Smith. Accompanied by Detective Black and another officer, Constable Simpson to-night made other discoveries. The marsh, completely hidden from sight. ### STILL ANOTHER FAILURE

FOLLOWS WALL ST. 'WASH'

A. O. Brown & Co. Go Under and Affairs Are Tangled—Toronto Clients Are Protected.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—A. O. Brown & Co., one of the largest brokerage houses in this city, announced their suspension on the Stock Exchange this afternoon.

The transactions of the firm in the remarkable stock market of last Saturday have been under investigation by the authorities of the Stock Exchange and to-day it was announced that transactions had been made for the firm's account under the rule which provides that where a firm is unable to deliver stock sold to another broker the purchases may be made in the stock at the expense of the firm failing to make delivery.

At the height of the boom markets of several years ago, A. O. Brown & Co., did an enormous business, said to have been larger than any other brokerage house at one time. There were five branch offices in this city and many others throughout the country, but after the panic of last fall many of the out-of-town branches were closed. At the present time, however, the firm have offices in Buffalo, Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, Erie, Utica, Toronto, Ont., and Paterson, N.J. The firm was organized in 1892. Its members are A. O. Brown, Lea Stout, E. F. Buchanan, Samuel C. Brown and W. Rhea Whitman.

P. W. Noel has been named as assignee. No statement of assets and liabilities is available as yet, but it is presumed that the figures will be large as the firm is generally supposed to have had a heavy interest in the market.

Badly Tangled. A representative of the suspended firm gave out this statement: "The affairs of the firm are badly tangled, and it was felt necessary to suspend in order to straighten them out."

The effect of the suspension upon the stock market was not so violent as anticipated by those who knew how large an amount of stocks A. O. Brown & Co. owed to other firms. The volume of trading increased rapidly, but for a short time in financial circles. The branch office here was in charge of J. Lorne Campbell with headquarters at 100 King-street.

Mr. Campbell when asked if he had any statement to make said: "I have only received the bare information of the suspension from my firm and know nothing further. Accounts with Toronto brokers are very small at present and any losses here will only be of a paltry nature."

### Montrealers Safe.

MONTREAL, Aug. 25.—(Special.)—A. O. Brown & Co. retired from Montreal some months ago, and also reduced the number of its branches throughout the States.

The firm will not entail any loss to Montrealers, as the local accounts were all settled at the time of the withdrawal.

### Seaman Court-martialed.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—Able Seaman Herbert Capley of H. M. S. Minotaur, struck his superior officer while the ship was lying at anchor last month, and was court-martialed at Chatham in consequence. He told the court that he was in a passion at the time, he was sentenced to six months hard labor, to be followed by dismissal from the service.

### Town of North Toronto

### COURT OF REVISION re LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

Take notice that the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of North Toronto intend to construct the following local improvement works on certain streets, to-wit:

(a) A concrete sidewalk (4 feet in width), with necessary grading, upon and along the line of the easterly limit of Lot No. 28, Plan M12, easterly along the northern side of said street to its intersection with the line of the easterly limit of Lot No. 12, according to Plan M51, a distance of 127 feet, more or less.

(b) A concrete sidewalk (4 feet in width), with necessary grading, upon and along the northern side of Marton-street, from a connection with a similar sidewalk (now being constructed) at its intersection with the line of the easterly limit of Lot No. 28, Plan M12, easterly along the northern side of said street to its intersection with the line of the easterly limit of Lot No. 12, according to Plan M51, a distance of 127 feet, more or less.

(c) A tar and gravel sidewalk (4 feet in width), with necessary grading, upon and along the northern side of Roshampton-avenue, from its intersection with the line of the easterly limit of Lot No. 12, easterly along the northern side of said avenue to its intersection with the line of the easterly limit of Lot No. 12, according to Plan M51, a distance of 127 feet, more or less.

(d) A six-inch water main, hydrants, valves and other necessary connections, upon, along and under Roshampton-avenue, from a connection with the present water main at the easterly limit of Lot No. 12, easterly along the northern side of said avenue to the line of the easterly limit of Lot No. 12, according to Plan M51, a distance of 127 feet, more or less.

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
