ART AND MORALS CONFLICT

LITERARY WORK IN COURT

Coroner Johnson Appears As a Critic and Magistrate Kingsford Remands the Case.

Without giving defendants counsel an opportunity to combat the crown's charges, Magistrate Kingsford yesterday committed L. J. Skill and J. C. King, proprietor and manager of the Toronto Antiquarian Book Company, to the sessions to face charges of circulating obscene literature. His worship permitted the crown's evidence to be taken, in the testimony of Chief Coroner Arthur Jukes Johnson, who had been permitted to look over some of the few books that had been seized on a search warrant by Detective Kennedy; but cut off Hugh Ross, K.C., who appeared on Mr. Skill's behalf, in his cross-examination of the witness, with the remark: "This is not a trial, but an investigation. All I want to know is, 'Have these books a tendency to corrupt morals?' The rest is for the jury." H. H. Dewar, K.C., acting for the crown, asked of Dr. Johnson, "What do you say as to the character of these books?" "They are not all alike," replied the witness. "One of them, called 'Fair Game for the Ladies,' is a collection of obscene stories, with pictures tending to corrupt morals. It is very cunningly and cleverly gotten up, a little bit of fact being embellished with lewd stories. 'Another book called 'Crossways of Sea,' is an attempt to get into the realm of scientific work. The second volume is obscene and neither has any scientific value. 'A third book, 'What Nerve Dies,' is a translation from the French by Oscar Wilde. It is very suggestive, though written in fine English. I would consider it a waste of time for any reasonable man to read it. It is absolutely foul and suggestive in every way.' Dr. Johnson remarked that this book was in striking similarity to all of Wilde's books, whereupon, Lawyer Rose wanted to know where he got his qualifications as a literary critic. What book of Wilde's books he had read he did not recall. When he read any of them before and where? "Witness could recall neither a title nor a definite occasion when he had perused a Wilde composition. Referring to 'Fair and Gallant Ladies,' Mr. Rose asked if there was anything in the volume that was not fact. His worship advised witness that it was not necessary to answer any more questions. Later, on behalf of Manager J. C. King, J. W. Curry, K.C., asked that Dr. Johnson be recalled, but the magistrate, without othering, refused. Postoffice Inspector Henderson said that Skill had admitted to him having sent out thru the mails 600 circulars a month advertising many of the books alleged by the crown to be obscene. The circulars, which are yellow in color, were filed as exhibits with the court. The last batch was sent out on June 1 last. The defence's claim is that there was not the slightest intention of circulating the books in question for immoral purposes. They were only intended for literary devotees of the highest psychic attainments, and were less objectionable than some publications that have been accorded the sanction of the court. The prices, ranging from \$2.00 to \$20.00, prohibited them for common use, and the editions were limited. At the conclusion of Dr. Johnson's evidence, Mr. Skill was committed to trial on the charge of circulating immoral books and on a second charge of improperly using the mails. Mr. King was also committed, charged with giving assistance to Mr. Skill. Bail was granted both men, Mr. Skill's bond being \$1000 and Mr. King's \$500. To the World, after the proceedings, Mr. King said: "Our position in this matter is very simple. We claim that the books seized and which we are being prosecuted for having in our possession are classics of the world's literature, and are of great moral and scientific value, and are sold by us only to scholars and collectors who have every right to acquire them. Some of these books are universally recognized and quoted as standard authorities on the subjects of which they treat, and as such are to be found in important public and private libraries everywhere."

NORTH TORONTO BYLAWS GROWING IN FAVOR

Every Day Adds to Prospect of Success—County and Suburban Happenings.

NORTH TORONTO, July 14.—(Special).—The bylaws now before the ratepayers of North Toronto will receive their hearty approval, it is believed, to-day, questioned regarding the merits of the two measures. "The parallel roads will never again be put thru at so reasonable a rate, and its advantages are apparent, while the sewerage to my mind is of vital necessity to the health of the town. We all admit the necessity of the two improvements, and the cost will never be felt over the town," said he. President W. G. Ellis of the Ratepayers' Association, who was the reporter, and has always given the proposed bylaws his hearty endorsement. "After the first year the cost will not be felt and the city of Toronto can well afford it," said he. A trip thru the several wards shows little if any diversity of opinion as to the general merits of the proposed bylaws. In fact, the opposition is largely in Davisville, where in fact a very large proportion of the estimated cost will be incurred. Davisville stands to gain enormously by the passage of the two bylaws. The central and northern divisions of the town will, it is believed, give substantial majorities. That the cemetery trust are quietly working to defeat the will of the ratepayers is undeniable, but neither the efforts of corporations nor the influence of a subsidized press will effect the desired result. The majority of the ratepayers of North Toronto realize that if the present opportunity is lost, there is little hope of the legislation coming to the aid of the municipality.
