WHITE ROSE DAY ON SEPT. SEVEN

Funds to Be Donated to Consumptive Children's Hospital at Weston.

CAMPAIGN ORGANIZED

Under the Patronage of Her Majesty Queen Mary.

Under the patronage of Her Majesty Queen Mary, Thursday, Sept. 7, will be observed as "White Rose Day" in Toronto, and the citizens will be confronted on every hand by girls selling white roses. This will be the second time that this day has been observed in Toronto, and the funds raised will be donated to the Queen Mary Hospital for Consumptive Children at Weston, which was opened in the year 1913 by Queen Mary herself, who touched a button in Buckingham Palace which completed an electric current causing the doors of the institution to open.

Yesterday afternoon over 200 ladies gathered in the Gaze Institute on College street for the purpose of organizing this year's campaign for raising money for this noble work. At this

meeting, which was most enthusiastic and presaged great results for Sept. 7, the captains and teams for the various districts of the city were chosen. About 8000 ladies will take part in the selling of roses, and the city has been divided into 42 districts, each under the command of a chaplain and a captain.

At the meeting yesterday Mrs. G. R. Baker, who is organizer and has so successfully conducted similar affairs, presided. Addresses were delivered by Mrs. Arthur VanKoughnet, who spoke on the great need of help for the consumptive children; Dr. Margaret Gordon also spoke on the great importance of the work.

Queen Mary's suggestion. "White Rose Day" was organized a year ago under the patronage of her majesty, who gave permission to have her name applied to the day, and she suggested the emblem should be the white rose. She was particularly desirous that the white rose be used in fighting tuberculosis, because in Russia for years the flower had been the emblem of the white plague. She desired that the organization for its results, combatting of this disease should spread over the entire Dominion, but this has not yet been done.

So, on Thursday, Sept. 7, the citizens of Toronto will be called upon once more to show their generosity and good will by contributing liberally to a cause which is far-reaching in its results and in helping the Queen Mary Hospital for Sick Children they will also be aiding the cause of humanity by assisting to wipe out this terrible disease.

BIG DEBT MAY BOOST WATER RATES IN CITY

City Officials Look Askance at Growing Deficit and Consider Increase of Rates.

The increasing debt charges in connection with the water works are such that the city officials deem a revision upward of the rates both for lawn sprinkling and in fact all rates paid by the consumers as absolutely essential. A deficit of \$80,000 this year is expected and this will be larger next year unless the rates are increased.

An investigation will be made to see if the city is paying enough for its own services, and if the meter rates are sufficiently high. During the last few years a large part of the cost of maintenance has been borne by the city thus keeping down the deficit, and it is thought that too great a part of the water rates is being paid in taxes.

BRANTFORD MAN GASED.

BRANTFORD, Ont., Aug. 24.—Official notice has been received by his wife to the effect that Sgt. Alfred Bowles has been gassed, although the official casualty list gives him as being wounded. He was formerly a recruiting sergeant with the 32nd Battery, and left for overseas with the ammunition column of the 40th Battery from Toronto. Previous to enlistment he worked in the local postoffice. He is now in the hospital at Cambridge.

TROOPER DUNDAS DIED IN GERMANY

Member of Toronto Unit Officially Reported Prisoner and Death Followed.

TWENTY-SIX OTHERS

Four Killed in Action and Twenty-One Are Wounded.

Yesterday's casualty list was still large and contained the names of 27 Toronto men. Four have been killed in action; one has died of wounds in Germany; one is seriously ill, and 21 have been wounded.

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ally reported to have died of wounds in a prisoner in Germany. He enlisted with a Toronto unit in the C.M.R. and went to England in the second contingent. He was reported missing after the battle of Zillebeke and unofficially reported a prisoner three weeks later.

Lieut. Duke W. Rowat, who has been reported wounded, is a son of the late Duke W. and Mrs. D. L. Rowat of the Alhama Apartments. He took out a commission in the imperial army. He is about 20 years of age and formerly was employed in the Imperial Bank.

Gunner Robert Harrison, 1588 Dundas street, who enlisted in Toronto with an artillery unit, has been wounded. He had no previous military experience and had been in the trenches about a year.

Wounded After Three Months. Pte. W. Plowman, whose relatives reside at 37 Berrymore street, has been wounded after serving in the trenches three months. He enlisted with a 3rd contingent unit in the 75th Battalion last fall, and in England was transferred to another unit at the front.

Pte. W. J. Hannan was wounded by a gunshot in the shoulder on Aug. 15, and came to Toronto three years ago. He was admitted to the hospital at Calais. He went to the front in June with reinforcements from the 74th Battalion. His wife and three children reside at 16 Empire avenue.

Wounded in Left Arm. Pte. H. Trim has received a wound in his left arm. He enlisted a year ago with the 51st Battalion. His wife

lives in West Toronto. He has two brothers in arms.

Pte. W. Bloomer, 151 Riverdale avenue, was wounded on Aug. 15. He went overseas with the 75th Battalion and reached the firing line in June. He was a machinist and had former military experience with the 9th Mississauga Horse.

Pte. W. H. Page, 1259 Danforth avenue, has been severely wounded in the shoulder and leg, and is in the hospital at Wimereux. He was born in England and came to this country four years ago. He enlisted a year ago and has been at the front several months.
