DIRECTORS DECIDE TO MAKE AN APPEAL

News of the order dissolving the Standard Oil Co. caused an outbreak of liquidation on the stock exchange, and there were general declines of anywhere from one to four points in the general list.

The opinion of the court recites that the seven individual defendants, during the ten years prior to 1873, acquired control of nineteen concerns engaged in the oil business, and that in 1873 they united these interests.

or to prolong the unlawful monopoly of such concerns obtained by the defendants as stated in the decree, and they are forbidden from engaging or continuing in interstate commerce until they discontinue their illegal combination.

The decree takes effect thirty days from the date of its filing, unless suspended by an appeal to the supreme court.

GOMPERS AGAIN PRESIDENT OF A. F. OF L.

Closing Session of Parliament of Labor Marked by Unanimity in the Choice of Its Officers.

Officers of the A. F. of L. for the ensuing year: President—Sam Gompers.

"An office in the labor movement is the highest honor which a man can hold," said Sam Gompers, when he was re-elected President of the American Federation of Labor at the closing session of the convention in Massey Hall on Saturday.

W. B. Wilson and T. V. O'Connor were appointed fraternal delegates to Great Britain, and J. P. Frey, A. Urie, and F. Duffy were nominated to act in conjunction with the executive to effect a settlement of the trouble among the electrical workers.

ALL RE LINE OF DEFENCE FOR BRITAIN

Anxiety to Boost the East Led Canadian Government to Reject Admiralty's Comprehensive Defence Scheme.

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—(Special).—Information regarding the proposals which the British admiralty made to Canada and the answer which the Canadian representatives gave, are beginning to leak out in spite of ministerial care.

The British admiralty's idea, after consulting with the Dominions beyond the seas, was that Great Britain herself would guard the Atlantic and the Mediterranean, making up a line of defence between Canada and India via Gibraltar. Canada would place a naval unit on the Pacific Coast, and connect with the Australian units to guard the Pacific; Australia would connect with New Zealand, and New Zealand with India, thus completing the circle.

The scheme involved the defence of the Atlantic coast of Canada by the mother country, Canada to lay down dry docks and repair plants for the use of the fleet, which would also be used, of course, by merchant vessels.

But it was felt by the Canadian provinces and Quebec would never stand for a Canadian fleet on the Pacific. In fact, the majority of the British admiralty's statement, must be on the St. Lawrence, and the fact that she would have none of this world-wide defence scheme.

There is this to be said, however, in defence of the Canadian Government's proposal, that it will have a great value in developing the Canadian Canadian militia, which must always be an early consideration in any scheme of naval defence. The British Government's present proposal may lead to the development of the imperial plan, the debate will bring on the question of immediate necessity.
