ORBY

LONDON, June 11.—Richard Croker had revenge upon the stewards of the Jockey Club for the slight put upon him more than two years ago when Orby his three-year-old colt, swept past the post at Epsom a clear winner by two and a half lengths of the Derby, the most clas-

sic of all classic events on the British turf.

Prohibited from training his horses at Newmarket, Mr. Croker brought over to Epsom the half American, Irish trained horse, which showed a clean pair of heels to the rest of the field, the favorite, Shive Gallion, on which the English pub-

lic had staked its money and which all the turf writers have been proclaiming unbeatable, sprawling home exhausted by an effort to hold third place.

Mr. Croker's victory was witnessed by a large number of his fellow countrymen; in fact, I have never seen so many Americans out on Derby day. Among the thousands of vehicles that lined the road from

London to Epsom Downs from early morning came many coaches and automobiles whose occupants were from New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and scores of other cities across the Atlantic, and the grand stand enclosure looked at times like a section Belmont Park or Sheepshead Bay.

BASE BALL

Errors on the part of every player of the St. Joseph's infield, and some of the best season's slab work performed by Howe for the St. Peter's resulted in the defeat of last year's champions by the boys in green and white last evening on the Chamrock grounds.

Four or five hundred people watched the game and, the majority being North Enders, there was great jubilation when the St. Peter's players took the lead and rapidly increased it, winning in five innings by the score of 8 to 3, and causing the St. Joseph's to fall into second place.

Howe pitched great ball, especially in the first two innings, striking out five men and leading the hit well down. Britt, at first base, seemed to be off, and Cregan and Long did not play in their usual sloppy style. The ball was snuffed, fumbled and wildly thrown, and the North End boys, taking every chance, managed to get the eight runs. Cregan in the box for the St. Joseph's, showed some of his old time form, but the poor support of the infield nullified his work.

CANADIAN GOLF MEET

Programme of the Twelfth Annual Meeting Announced.

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The detailed programme of the twelfth annual meeting of the Royal Canadian Golf Association is out. The meet is fixed for the end of June, and will start on the 29th of that month, continuing without a break till the 7th of July, on the links of the Lambton Golf and Country Club, Toronto.

The interprovincial match, Ontario vs. Quebec when ten of the picked players from each province will be pitted against each other will again be a feature, besides the usual open championship and the amateur championship of Canada. The open championship will be 72 holes of medal play, with a first prize of \$100, while in the amateur championship each game will consist of eighteen hole match play, with the exception of the final which goes over just double the number of holes. PRESENTATION OF THE PRIZES

Winners in Every Day Club Sports Received Their Prizes From the Mayor in Every Day Club Rooms Last Night.

At a public meeting held last night in the hall of the Every Day Club, the prizes won in the sports held on the Victoria grounds May 24, were presented to the successful contestants by His Worship Mayor Seavey. The attendance was large and while the people were gathering Jack Walker played a number of violin selections accompanied on the piano by his sister, Miss Walker.

A. M. Belding, the president gave an address referring to the work which had already been done and which it was hoped to be accomplished by members of the club. He also pointed out that so far there had been expended for rent and other items \$250 or \$30 more than has been collected from all sources. He went on to speak of the high school sports to be held next Saturday; the dramatic entertainment to be repeated in the hall June 29, and the field sports to be held June 22, urging the club members to be clean healthy sports at heart to attend.

The following programme was then given: every number being heartily endorsed: Misses McArthur, violin and piano; Miss DeCue, humorous reading; and Fred A. Dixon, solo, Alabama. The chairman then called on His Worship who was received with loud applause.

Mayor Seavey gave an address dwelling on the importance of athletic exercise and the part they had played in human history. He went on to speak of the Every Day Club, and said it gave him great pleasure on Victoria Day to see the work done by members of the club on the athletic ground. He paid a warm tribute to the men who, after a hard day's work could spare a few hours in the evening for such a cause, and thought that they and the club to which they belonged should receive hearty and general support. Many young men in the city who had leisure time on their hands, could not put their time to better advantage than in such work.

The prize winners were then called to the front and amid renewed applause His Worship presented the medals on the breast of Messrs Stubbs, Sterling and Kiley. He referred briefly to the record of each and expressed the hope that their example and success would stimulate others and lead to a renewed interest in athletic matters in the city.

G. A. Stubbs received three medals, Urban Kiley two and E. Sterling one. Other prize winners presented were R. Garrett, Chester Brown, Arthur Butts, H. C. Clark, S. Stackhouse, and Harry Short. Fred, Bovard of Hampton, who took the medal for the 100 yards dash; A. W. Thorne, now of Moncton, H. Debenham, who won two second prizes for jumping and W. Malcolm, were not present last evening.
