II.—THE WORK OF THE LOCAL BRANCHES.

Independently of the 107 Branches of these two Auxiliaries there are 250 other Branches directly connected with the Upper Canada Bible Society. Of this number 17 were formed by the Agents during the year. In some instances the contributions by the branches have been very largely in excess of last year, and quite beyond the average contributions per head of many other parts of the Province.
