II.—THE WORK OF THE LOCAL BRANCHES.

Independently of the 107 Branches of these two Auxiliaries there are 250 other Branches directly connected with the Upper Canada Bible Society. Of this number 17 were formed by the Agents during the year. As already intimated, the zeal and activity displayed by many of these branches have been most encouraging to us, as well as being highly creditable to them. In some instances the contributions by the branches have been very largely in excess of last year, and quite beyond the average contributions per head of many other parts of the Province. III.—THE LABOURS OF THE AGENTS.

The Directors feel it due to the Agents to state that their labours have been most faithfully and energetically performed during the past year. Undeterred by bad roads or the unusually heavy snow drifts of
