

TURKEY WILL PERMIT RELIEF FOR SYRIANS

Ottoman Government Yields To Pleas by Washington for Starving People

Washington, Sept. 18.—The Turkish government, in a communication received at the state department, consents to shipment of relief supplies from the United States to famine sufferers in Syria. The action reverses the previous attitude of Turkish officials, who had refused two urgent pleas of the department for the privilege to make food shipments. Distribution of the supplies which already have been offered in large quantities by Syrian and American relief societies, would be made under the Turkish plan, through the port of Beirut. State department officials believe that inasmuch as the French government has been anxious to get such supplies through, and may itself contribute, assent of the Entente Allies for passage of shipments through the blockade of Turkey may be confidently expected.

Ton Shell Went Through House


Fired From Sixteen-inch Gun, it Penetrated Armor Plate and Sank Washington, Sept. 18.—Word comes to Washington today that a 16-inch solid steel shell, said to be the first ever fired from a naval gun of that calibre, went through a plate of armor and a thick sand bag backing at the naval proving grounds at Indian Head, Md., on the Potomac River, about thirty miles from Washington, and struck the house of an employe of the proving grounds some distance away, inflicting considerable damage. Mrs. William D. Swann and her two children, who were in the house had a narrow escape. The ordinance officers say the test has great importance as showing the tremendous power of the new naval gun, the largest in the world for naval purposes. Up to this time the 16-inch gun used on the British dreadnoughts of the Queen Elizabeth class have been the largest on any warship. The shell was fired with a small charge of explosive. The thickness of the armor through which the shell went is not disclosed, but it was said that with a full charge the shell could have penetrated from five to ten inches of armor at a distance of 20,000 yards. The shell weighed 2,100 pounds. Mrs. Swann was preparing the mid-day meal and had gone from the kitchen to the dining room a few minutes before the shell struck the house. With her were her two children, Gladys, eighteen, and Essie, four. Gladys was about to open the door from the dining room to the kitchen when the shell struck. It ploughed through the kitchen and demolished the porch outside, falling within a few feet of the porch steps. The shell was red hot.


